

Now I know how much people like talking about themselves and their experiences, (I know I do, IoI), so I'm asking you as members, to send me something that you would like to share with the group. I'll give you a few examples about myself with items that could be expanded into a good story.

- 1. My parents immigrated to Australia in 1962 with 5 kids in tow. We sailed on the Oriana (at the total cost of £50), went through the Suez Canal, (before it closed), arrived at Fremantle and were housed at Point Walter.
- 2. Getting the Cane in Primary School.
- 3. Sitting on the floor in the Activity Hall in Highschool watching the moon landing on a small black and white TV.
- 4. Left school when I was 15 and joined my father as an apprentice painter. We used to paint ceilings and walls with a six-inch brush (called a Block-Buster) and burnt paint off timber using a Blow Torch. I was one of the first painters in Australia to test out 'No-More-Gaps'. My opinion then, 'It would never take off'.
- 5. In 1981, my wife and I worked in Ireland for 5 months at the time Bobby Sands went on hunger strike and died. Northern Ireland's border was manned by armed British soldiers and Army Tanks, and Belfast was surrounded by a wire fence.

So as you can see, it would be easy to write something and share it with the group. Let's face it. We are all over 65 so you must have at least one good story to tell.

Many years ago, I was working as a community carer for the aged and people with disabilities. I'd been doing the job for ages — so let's be clear: I was not a rookie. I knew the ropes, the clients, the routines. Most days involved visiting regulars, helping with breakfast, medications, personal care — the usual. But every now and then, a new face would pop up on the schedule. Just enough surprise to keep life interesting.

One weekend, I was asked to cover a colleague's run. No problem! I checked the schedule on my phone — everything looked straightforward. A few regulars, a couple of new ones. Easy-peasy.

First stop: assist a man with early-stage dementia — let's call him **Jack** — with breakfast, meds, and a shower. I arrived at the address, double-checked the house number, and walked up to the door. Knocked. Smiled. Introduced myself as I had hundreds of times before.

Jack opened the door, cheerful as could be. Lovely man. We stayed on the porch, had a bit of a chat. He told me he'd already had breakfast. Great! One task down. He also said he'd taken his meds. Even better — things were going swimmingly.

Now, I did still need to go in and confirm that he had actually taken his medication — duty of care and all that. But Jack was happily chatting away, and I was doing my best to gently coax him toward that third tick-box: the much-needed shower.

Cue the classic carer pep talk: "You'll feel so much better after a shower, Jack!" "It'll refresh you for the day!"

Jack smiled politely... and politely declined. Several times.

Now, any carer knows you can't force a shower. But I gave it my best charm. We'd been chatting for 15-20 minutes at this point, and I was starting to feel the clock tick. I hadn't made it past the porch. No meds checked. No shower achieved. No actual entry into the house.



Feeling a bit defeated, I headed back to my car to call the office and report my (very pleasant but ultimately fruitless) visit with Jack.

Just as I was about to dial, ring ring — the office called me.

"Where are you? Your client says you haven't arrived yet."

I paused. "I've been here nearly 20 minutes. Jack was lovely, said he'd eaten, had his meds, didn't want a shower..."

My manager asked me to confirm the name and address again. And that's when the penny dropped.

Thank you, Pauline, for sharing your very amusing story. I think everyone will get a laugh out of it. I'm not quite sure how I would have reacted if I was Jack, lol.

Eventually, I made it to the real **Jack's** house, where I was warmly welcomed and promptly allowed inside.

Lesson of the day?
