Nicholas Gleeson, an adventurer and author, joined us to talk about his extraordinary life.

We were totally mesmerised, entertained and inspired by Nicholas who ran us through a full range of human emotions.

Becoming blind at seven through an accident, Nicholas continually challenged himself through school and University and went on to live a life of adventure and sport. He has competed in marathons in New York and Durban, has represented Australia in blind cricket, climbed some of the world's highest mountains and trekked across deserts.

Nicholas has been an Australian Para-Olympian. He is an advocate for people with a disability. Nicholas' aim in life is to help

everyone to cope with whatever challenges confront any one of us in life.

Nicholas is an amazing, humble man and gifted speaker who lives life to the full. He was accompanied by his faithful seeing-eye-dog Jarvis.

Our final speaker for this year will be Bill Phippen who is a civil engineer and later in his career has moved into history and engineering heritage.

He has published 5 books, won many awards, including in 2010 NSW Senior Volunteer and also in 2013 Engineers Australia included him in their list of 100 Most Influential Engineers in the country.

Bill was awarded an Order of Australia Medal in 2013 for service to people with disability through the charity Technical Aid to the Disabled.

His current project is preparing for the Centenary Celebration of the Sydney Harbour Bridge opening in 2032.

Bill's talk will centre on a workmate of John Bradfield, who is an unsung and little-known hero, who played a vital role in the building of the Sydney Harbour Bridge.



A POEM FROM KEN DAVIES

The Green Eye Of The Little Yellow God



J Milton Hayes 1884-1940

There's a one-eyed yellow idol to the north of Khatmandu, There's a little marble cross below the town; There's a broken-hearted woman tends the grave of Mad Carew, And the Yellow God forever gazes down.

He was known as "Mad Carew" by the subs at Khatmandu, He was hotter than they felt inclined to tell; But for all his foolish pranks, he was worshipped in the ranks, And the Colonel's daughter smiled on him as well.

He had loved her all along, with a passion of the strong, The fact that she loved him was plain to all. She was nearly twenty-one and arrangements had begun To celebrate her birthday with a ball.

He wrote to ask what present she would like from Mad Carew; They met next day as he dismissed a squad; And jestingly she told him then that nothing else would do But the green eye of the little Yellow God.

On the night before the dance, Mad Carew seemed in a trance, And they chaffed him as they puffed at their cigars: But for once he failed to smile, and he sat alone awhile, Then went out into the night beneath the stars.

He returned before the dawn, with his shirt and tunic torn, And a gash across his temple dripping red; He was patched up right away, and he slept through all the day, And the Colonel's daughter watched beside his bed. He woke at last and asked if they could send his tunic through; She brought it, and he thanked her with a nod; He bade her search the pocket saying "That's from Mad Carew," And she found the little green eye of the god.

She upbraided poor Carew in the way that women do, Though both her eyes were strangely hot and wet; But she wouldn't take the stone and Mad Carew was left alone With the jewel that he'd chanced his life to get.

When the ball was at its height, on that still and tropic night, She thought of him and hurried to his room; As she crossed the barrack square she could hear the dreamy air Of a waltz tune softly stealing thro' the gloom.

His door was open wide, with silver moonlight shining through; The place was wet and slipp'ry where she trod; An ugly knife lay buried in the heart of Mad Carew, 'Twas the "Vengeance of the Little Yellow God."

J. Milton Hayes was a British poet whose work continues to resonate with audiences today, particularly his iconic poem "The Green Eye of the Little Yellow God." This piece, with its compelling narrative and rhythmic cadence, cemented Hayes's place in popular culture and continues to be widely recited and anthologized.

Hayes's work falls within the realm of narrative poetry, a style that was particularly popular in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Like his contemporaries, <u>Rudyard Kipling</u> and Robert W. Service, Hayes favoured strong rhythms and rhyme schemes that lent themselves to memorization and recitation. His poems often tell compelling stories, drawing the reader into richly imagined scenes and dramatic situations.

"The Green Eye of the Little Yellow God" exemplifies the hallmarks of Hayes's style: vivid imagery, exotic settings, and suspenseful storytelling. The poem's enduring popularity speaks to its ability to transport readers and listeners to another time and place, captivated by the allure of adventure and the power of evocative language.

Book club number one held their meeting last week where we discussed our choice for this month of HIDDEN NATURE by Nora Roberts.


It was a good meeting with different discussions on how we felt about this book. Some thought it was only average. It was a little too predictable .

Once again, we had an enjoyable book club meeting.




BOOK CLUB #2




It was great to see so many readers at this month's Book Club 2 meeting and a special welcome back to Joy.


Although we did this walk with Jim years ago it was good to revisit and introduce the walk to a new set of walkers.
