General Business:

Guest Speaker: Dr Kathryn Goozee. Dementia.

John welcomed Kathryn Founding Director/CEO of the KaRa MINDS at the Institute of Neurological Diseases, Macquarie Park. She holds an Hon. A/Prof position within the medical faculty of Macquarie University and has 30 years of clinical experience in dementia in a variety of health settings; a PhD in Clinical Neuroscience from University of WA conducting clinical trials for the prevention of Alzheimer's disease and since 2008 has specialised in dementia. Challenging the boundaries of existing health models. Kathryn's address on Prevention, Detection Research and Care included slides showing healthy, declining and severely affected patients. She emphasised the need to generate a message of prevention and treatment, without stigma. Family reviews and testing is a critical aspect today in a growing Australian problem where 70 types of Alzheimers have been identified and blood tests are now measuring wide ranging pathology. Clinical trials for treatment using tablets, injections, IV infusions and vaccines are underway alongside a wide range of preventative measures including dealing with alcohol, cholesterol diabetes, hearing, sight, environment, sports head injuries and smoking.

Ongoing prevention studies of volunteer groups in 55- to 75-year-olds, with no prior diagnosis, nor considered to be at risk, are a leading aspect of clinical trials, and this is leading to volunteers opting for vaccinations to reduce or even stop progression of the disease. Currently women are more likely to suffer than men whilst chances are low genetically. Memory loss is an ageing matter for some people it is not a clear sign of troubles ahead. Deliberate decluttering of mind is a useful application to help enjoy a clear pathway ahead.

Although community costs are high from dementia, governments remain restrained in providing the level of assistance that develop more successful research.
