
October 6 – 13 Broken Hill with Silver City Tours

A member's story

Catherine Turner joined our club in March 2024. She describes her interesting career.

"Where would you like to teach?", they asked. Naively, I believed the Department of Education really wanted to know, but instead they appointed me to Wallsend High School. In the 1960s Wallsend was a rough and ready community, renowned for coal mining and greyhound racing.

After 18 months the Department decreed that I should go to Taree "without delay". It took me some time to navigate the country town social strata, but my degree guaranteed access to elite discussion groups! I remember wonderful summer days racing off to the surf after school or enjoying the hospitality of the golf club.

After a time at Kogarah, I joined Taree friends in Dawson Creek at Mile Zero of the Alaska Highway in Canada. There were exciting new sports such as curling, skating, skiing and the challenges of driving a car on ice in temperatures of -40 F. Studded tyres frozen square, heaters in the engine block, anti -freeze in the gas line and a handbrake never to be used in winter were commonplace.

Thence to Whitefriars Secondary Modern adjacent to the glass factory. I soon found out why they had vacancies for teachers in England!

Back eventually to Sydney with various educational roles at St Marys, Epping, Granville and Strathfield South High Schools.

Classroom teachers and principals acknowledge that they are both teachers and learners. My varied workplaces have showered me with the learning and wisdom of cultures, communities and values beyond my own. I am an enthusiastic promoter of the achievements of public education.
