Clubs that cluster


Earlier this year, ten Probus clubs on the Lower North Shore (Cremorne, Crows Nest, Lane Cove, Middle Harbour, Mosman, Neutral Bay (a men's club), Northbridge, North Sydney, Waverton and Wollstonecraft) got together to form a "Cluster Group". 

- Don't share your details. Never give your personal or banking details away over the phone if you didn't make the call. Even then, make sure it's a legitimate service provider or store that you know and trust.
- Check to protect. Independently verify any calls or notifications you have received about your device and its security, using professionals and contact information you trust and have sourced yourself.
