Report on Member's Presentation by Heather Robertson

Heather spoke of her role as a Group Leader for an American educational travel company known as Road Scholar and the participants in their programmes around the world are known as Roads Scholars. The company offers over 5000 programmes in all 50 states of the United States and in 100 other countries including New Zealand.

Participants average 72 years of age and tend to be open-minded, curious and value travel as an educational opportunity.



Heather leads a two-week programme called "A New Zealand Odyssey: Indigenous Culture and Natural Beauty" Which covers New Zealand history, flora and fauna, geology, political and legal structures and visits to places of interest from Auckland to Invercargill.

Heather shared some of her interesting experiences with groups and the general impressions of New Zealand participants shared with her – they were generally very positive.

A very well presented and well received session – thanks Heather.

Guest Speaker - Darren Guard - "Guard Family History"

Darren told us the story of the Guard family beginning with John Guard Later known as Jacky born in 1837 in England. As a labourer in 1813 he was sentenced to transportation for theft. Following his release Guard became a sealer, whaler, trader and sea-captain with a whaling station at Kakapo Bay in Port Underwood. In 1834 Guard, with his family, were on the 'Harriet' when it was wrecked off Taranaki. While John Guard raised ransom, Betty Guard (1814-1870) and their children were held by Ngati Awa. After

this incident the Guard family returned to Kakapo Bay where they continued whaling and later became farmers.

He traced his family history through to the present where he finds himself the last of six generations of Guards in the fishing industry. The amazing exploits of family members, their interaction with individual Māori and Māori communities, their conflicts and alliances made enthralling listening. Darren's easy-going style made the stories real and provided great word and visual pictures of the hard times, the successful and the not successful adventures a family which includes the first white woman in the South Island, the first white child born in the South Island and one of New Zealand's most renown boatbuilders.




The group usually takes a break over the Christmas period, December and January; let him know your thoughts.
