September Meeting Guest Speaker: Bill Johnston

Club member, Bill Johnson, spoke of he and his son's adventures in Nepal in 2023, a privately organised trip utilising New Zealand Rotary contacts and projects.

They and their Nepalese guide, Dhana, undertook several weeks trekking through the Phakoling Valley, visiting and staying in the many small villages. The roads have many large boulders and cattle are the main means of portering supplies along with the amazing loads carried by local Nepalese porters (including Bill and Paul's whisky for their night-caps.)

Bill explained that Nepal, a land locked nation, has 30 million people, 80% of whom are Hindu.

It is a relatively poor country and many Nepalese work abroad to earn incomes to support their families.

On the way to Everest and Lhotse peaks, they visited the market town of Namche Bazaar and Khumjung village, at 4000 metres, where there is the Sir Edmund Hilary school and hospital and a stunning memorial to Sherpa Tenzing Norgay.

They also visited their guide Dhana's village – Jubing, at 2000 metres, where Dhana is the headmaster of the school. The village houses had stone walls, all constructed manually.

Most cooking was done on a wood fire. Villagers grew millet, bananas, grapes, and tamarillos

on the vast terraced hillsides. Rotary clubs had helped pay for a reliable water supply for the village, and more recently, a toilet block (3 toilets) for the village, costing NZ \$15,000.

Thanks to Bill for such an interesting talk and the great photos and videos he used to illustrate his talk.

Guest Speaker: Joy Oakly, "Cawthron 100 Years and Joy's Journey"

Guest speaker, Joy Oakly, spoke about her long association and employment with the Cawthron Institute in Nelson which celebrated 100 years in 2021.

The founder, Thomas Cawthron, came to New Zealand in 1849, aged 15. By the age of 30 he was a highly successful businessman who turned his wealth into philanthropic investments such as

Rocks Road chains, Cathedral steps, the organ at the Nelson School of Music, and pursuing his vision that science could contribute to the growth of a young New Zealand. To this end the Cawthron Institute Board was set up in 1916 followed by the Thomas Cawthron Trust Act in 1924. Pre 1970 most research related to horticulture eg. Soil improvement, fruit crops such as apples, pears and apricots, and prevention and treatment of fungal and insect damage.

Other major areas of focus have been microbiology – raw milk, water, and food testing; chemistry – wood chips for export, and more recently study of microalgae (phytoplankton) and their critical role in marine environments.

Joy explained that the Cawthron Institute has been an international leader in developing a marine biotoxin monitoring programme moving to technology rather than the previous mice bioassay methods of monitoring.

In 1995 the Aquaculture Park was built at Glenduan, particularly focusing on mussels, flat oysters, paua, and salmon and more recently on high value natural products from microalgae.

At the centenary Joy was the longest standing employee- at 55 years. Initially she worked in chemistry research on plants, but in more recent years, in quality assurance

and laboratory accreditation to international standards. Joy continues to work part time two days per week and to undertake laboratory consultancy work in the Pacific. She shared with us some of her experiences working in Kiribati, Fiji, Samoa, and the Solomon Islands.

Joy was also the recipient of a QSM in 2024 for her services via Soroptimists International of Nelson in regard to education and employment of women and girls.

All in all, a very informative and interesting talk!

The group usually takes a break over the Christmas period, December and January; let him know your thoughts.




Book Challenge Group A reminder that the Book Challenge Group meets at the Honest Lawyer at 10am on the first Thursday of the month.
