Guest speaker **Sir Bruce Fergusson**, retired Chief of the NZ Defence Force, gave a very moving and emotional talk on the return of the unknown warrior to the NZ War Memorial in Buckle Street, Wellington. In 2004 Prime Minister Helen Clark instructed him to go to France and return the body of an unknown soldier from WW1 by ANZAC day just 4 weeks away.

He began the talk, by explaining in WW1, NZ sent 100,000 soldiers which at the time was 10% of our population of 1 million. Of those sent, 59,483 were casualties including 18,166 dead. On 15th September 1916, the NZ division joined the Battle of the Somme near Longueval. At 6:30am they were ordered to attack the Germans on a ridgeline above. They achieved their target but at the cost of 600 killed and 1200 wounded or missing. After armistice the Caterpillar Cemetery near Longueval became the main burial ground for soldiers from the battles. The cemetery contains 214 New Zealand soldiers plus 1272 unknown NZ soldiers. It was from this cemetery that a body was chosen to be the unknown warrior. A party of 74 flew to Longueval and selected the body of a soldier who had been approximately 5 feet 6 inches in height and there were no broken bones. The body remains were able to fit into a small box which was placed in a full-sized coffin. In typical military humour the body was given the nick-name 'Bob' (box of bones). Whilst in Longueval, the full visiting party walked the length of the battlefield and found a bayonet sticking out of the field at about the estimated position where the NZ forces would have gone through the barbed wire laid by the enemy. Sir Bruce ordered that the unknown warrior be accompanied by one or more members of the party at all times, day and night, during the journey to the cenotaph in Wellington.

In Longueval the body lay in state in the mayoral chambers until a moving ceremony at the memorial on the battle site. There was a large gathering and old men carried the standard of every French battalion involved in WW1. On arrival in Wellington, the body lay in state in Parliament overnight before being placed a gun carriage for full military parade around the bays to Pukeahu National War Memorial Park.
