Guest Speaker

Guest speaker Alfred Memelink is a renown watercolour artist and owner of the Alfred Memelink Artspace Gallery in Petone. He began with explaining that he was one of 7 children with creative parents. His father was an architect and amateur artist, and his mother was always busy with needlework. School holidays were often spent on art when the weather prevented outdoor activities. He told the story of 8 pupils at school being asked to draw their ideal playground. Some months later his drawing was used to create school playgrounds throughout NZ. Living in Petone he was always loved the sea and would often walk along the Wellington wharves before they were sealed off from the public. He researched occupations in a library book and decided to train as a marine engineer. After leaving school he obtained an apprenticeship at the old marine engineering workshop William Cable. Four years later he qualified and became an engineer on the P &O container ship 'Aotea' which sailed mainly between NZ and Japan. It entailed 3 months on 24/7 and 3 months off. During spare time on the ship, he began learning watercolour painting. He rose through the ranks to become Chief Engineer. He spent 2 years working in Singapore, worked in Europe, and crossed the Cook Strait more than 1000 times working on the ferries. After 8 years at sea, he began exhibiting his artwork in Wellington cafes and having success. By 2000 he was selling enough artwork to concentrate on his art and work parttime. He combined working 2 days per month on the old Wellington tugs and painting. By now he was receiving commission work. He jumped at the opportunity to spend 3 months on the NIWA research ship Tangaroa in the Antarctica and showed photos of the journey. The air is so dry that he had to dampen the paper to enable him to paint with watercolours.

He was given the opportunity to purchase an old derelict building on the Petone foreshore which became his gallery, opened in 2014. His paintings, and his signature always include a seagull. During school holidays he takes art classes for school children. For many years he has raised funds for the Te Omanga Hospice through his artwork.
