* Tuesday 5 August: Guided Tour of the Archibald Prize at The Art Gallery of NSW (original building). We will meet for morning tea at 10:30am at The Gallery Café (lower level 1 in the original building) before joining the guide in Kaldor Hall (ground floor in the original building) at 11:20 to allow for the tour to start at 11:30 sharp. While morning tea will be at our own expense, the guided tour will cost \$27.50 per person to be paid in advance.

- **★ 18 23 September: 6-day OnCourse Bellingen Gourmet Adventure**. All seats available to Mosman Probus on this tour have been allocated. This tour explores the wine and dining experiences of the Hunter Valley and the sustainable, artisan food culture of Bellingen and Dorrigo.
- * Thursday 9 October: A memorable lunch experience at Refettorio, 481 Crown Street, Surry Hills. This is the OzHarvest restaurant which uses funds donated by lunch participants to feed people in need. The menu is prepared by talented chefs and OzHarvest volunteers serve the meals. Previous Speaker: Steven Alderton Mosman: The Front Door to Art

Steven introduced himself by saying that he had been the Director of the Mosman Art Gallery and the Manager of Cultural Services at Mosman Council for just two months. In the talk that followed, Steven looked back at the long history of Aboriginal art in Mosman before turning to the Curlew Camp, which played a crucial role in the development of Australian Impressionism in the late 19th century. Steven then detailed the pioneering role played by the Mosman Art Prize in catalysing many similar art prizes across Australia. Finally, he looked forward to how the Mosman Art Gallery will continue its rich tradition as a national leader in art, shaping the future through contemporary, inclusive and community-driven programs.

Steven said that more than 100 Aboriginal sites, dating from over the past 5,000 years, have been recorded in the Mosman area. Cammeraigal ('gal' means 'people') country may have extended from the west as far east as Bradleys Head where Borogegal country probably began. Borogegal country then extended east to the harbour foreshore, covering the rest of Mosman.

Indigenous artefacts in Mosman include shell middens, sandstone engravings and pigment art. However, because of its coastal location, the art in the Mosman sites is different from that in the rest of inland Sydney.


Macropods, such as kangaroos and wallabies, feature strongly in Mosman's figurative rock art but Steven said that there are no human figures as there are elsewhere in Sydney. An average of one-third of engravings in the Sydney area

are bird or animal tracks whereas there is only a single example of such a track is recorded in Mosman. In addition, the next most common Sydney engraving is of marine animals (one-fifth) whereas two-thirds are marine animals in coastal Mosman. Further, in the Sydney region, hand stencils form half the examples of pigment

art recorded whereas in Mosman, they constitute over 80% (see photo above). More than two-thirds of the pigment art is found on hill slopes where large rock shelters occur and in Mosman the proportion is even higher.

Steven said that Mosman has four main areas of engraving (North-West, South-East, East and Middle Harbour), each of which is different. The North-West (Quakers Hat Bay area) and South-East (Bradleys and Chowder Heads) dominate, suggesting a dual focus of engraving activity. This may reflect the possibility that in the past, there were two Aboriginal clans present in the Mosman area as noted above – the Cammeraigal and Borogegal.

Curlew Camp was originally established around 1890 on Little Sirius Cove (now Taronga Zoo) by Reuben Brasch who owned a department store in Sydney. His family used the camp on weekends for recreation. Around 1891, Arthur Streeton moved into Curlew Camp when he relocated from Melbourne. Before moving, Streeton had lived in the Heidelberg camp where Australian Impressionism was emerging. Tom Roberts joined him soon after at the Curlew Camp.



Steven said that the artists who lived in Curlew Camp were fascinated by the luminous light and elemental grandeur of the landscapes that they painted around Sydney. They defined Australian art for generations to come so that the Australian landscape was far from ignored but mythologized. Arthur Streeton's much-loved 1896 painting, *The Purple Moon's Transparent Night*, shows the unique colours (blues and golds)

and atmosphere that so impressed the Australian Impressionists (see photo above). Curlew Camp artists were all passionate about Australia, its environment and landscape. Their self-conscious nationalistic sentiments were widespread leading up to the debates on federation.

The Mosman Art Prize, which was first awarded in 1947, was an idea promoted by Councillor Allan Gamble. Gamble was then a Lecturer in Architecture at Sydney University and subsequently published several well known books of his own drawings of University buildings. The Mosman Art Prize was the first significant local art prize in Australia, of which there are now over 50 offering prize money of more than one million dollars.

The Mosman Art Prize is currently worth \$70,000 and Steven said that last year there were 1,617 entries. It is an acquisitive art prize, which means that the winning painting is retained by the Mosman Council for addition to its collection of Art Prize winners, now numbering 78.

The first Mosman Art Prize had 51 entries that were judged by Lloyd Rees (who subsequently judged four more competitions before winning the Prize himself in 1981) and the winner was Margaret Olley. Other winners have included Grace Cossington-Smith (1952), Cressida Campbell (1989), Nicholas Harding (1993) and Lucy Culliton (2000).

The Mosman Art Gallery itself was established in 1998 by Mosman Council as a result of a community-led drive to provide a permanent home for the Mosman Art Prize and the Mosman Art Collection.

Steven ended his illuminating talk by looking to the future: how he wishes to open up even further the Art Gallery space to the community. This will require improvements in the heritage space, especially with respect to its climate control and audio properties. He also wishes to provide increased exhibition space for the Mosman Art Prize winners.
