# **Upcoming: \$2.50 Club Outing - Woy Woy** *Organiser: Pamela McLeland*

## Wednesday 8th October

**Directions:** Take the 114 or 144 bus from Mosman to Crows Nest and then the Metro to Epping. We will meet at **Epping Metro Station** at **10:30am** then walk (2 mins) to the nearby **EPPING RAILWAY STATION** to take the train that leaves for Woy Woy at **10:45am**. The train travels alongside the pretty Brisbane Waters near Gosford and we will arrive at **Woy Woy** at 11:30am.

Then follows a 10-minute walk to The River where there are three choices:

A quick bite to eat with take-away from the restaurant and a ferry ride to Empire Bay and return. Cost: Adult \$20pp return;
 Concession: \$10pp return. Bookings required for groups for this ferry (Opal Card not accepted).

- 2. Lunch at the hotel opposite the restaurant. Check out the menu at woywoyhotel.com.au
- 3. Finally, we can book the Wharf restaurant for groups of 8 and over, with a set menu costing \$75pp.



## Previous Speaker: Rosalie Horner Waltzing Mathilde-Letters to a little girl




Rosalie's first historical novel, *Waltzing Mathilde - Letters to a little girl*, is based on the true story of her grandmother, Mathilde. She was raised in Germany until aged 12 by her großmutter whose advancing years forced her to give up Mathilde. This resulted in 1890 in Mathilde reluctantly traveling alone by ship from Germany to Australia to live with her uncle in Sydney. Ultimately, Mathilde made her home at 24 Moruben Rd, Mosman.

Rosalie's novel is a classic example of what is nowadays termed "creative nonfiction". Creative

nonfiction combines the narrative techniques of fiction writing with the

factual historical accuracy of nonfiction, exploring reallife stories through the author's creative imagination. It is a genre where authors use conventional storytelling techniques to imagine how storylines might have been set, how dialogues were conducted and how characters were developed. Invented characters may also be introduced. It tells what are historically true stories in an imaginative and engaging way, aiming to engage the reader at least as deeply as conventional fiction by providing a more familiar background. It is a genre that has been expanding exponentially in recent times.



An important feature of creative nonfiction is that the background of historical reality contained within the narrative of the novel has been thoroughly researched. Rosalie has detailed in her book the numerous historical institutions in Sydney, London, Hannover and Bremen that she consulted for her book. With reference to the title of the book, Rosalie in a foreword says that "to waltz Matilda is to travel with a swag (Matilda) containing all one's worldly goods", which is certainly what her 5 grandmother did when she migrated to Australia. Rosalie then repeats the

more controversial statement that this Australian phrase is "derived from the German term 'auf der Walz' to travel in a circular fashion, leaving home to come home."

Rosalie said that her book is composed of three parts: the first details Mathilde's heartbreak on being told she was being sent away from her beloved großmutter and Germany; the second describes her sea voyage to Australia; and the third covers her settling into her new home in Sydney. Undoubtedly, Mathilde's emigration from Germany ended her childhood.

The narrative of the book from the very beginning focuses on the orphan Mathilde, who was raised happily in Hannover for 12 years by her großmutter. Her own mother, Johanna, had died several weeks after Mathilde's birth and her father had subsequently disappeared (any relevant records had been destroyed in WW2). In light of her increasingly imminent mortality and confronted by financial stress, Mathilde's großmutter decided that Mathilde should go and live with her prosperous art dealer uncle, Willy Alderhaven, and his family in Sydney.

This decision forces Mathilde reluctantly to confront the greatest challenge of her life: the loss of country, home, family and friends, not to mention her beloved music studies. Being an excellent singer, her ambition had been to become a singer at the Hannover Opera House.

To travel to Sydney, Mathilde alone boards the SS *Kaiser Wilhelm II* (a passenger liner launched a year earlier) in Bremerhaven. *Kaiser Wilhelm II* carried 906 passengers and 140 crew. The 26,000 km (16,000 miles) journey took about 2 months.

On arrival in Sydney, the 1890s Depression was overshadowing all aspects of Sydney life. Music and especially letters from Germany helped Mathilde endure her subsequent life of drudgery, isolation and family tragedy as she navigated the darker side of Sydney's art world in the employ of her Uncle Willy. A captivating Irishman wins Mathilde's heart but she is met with betrayal.

According to one letter discovered in her effects after her death in 1964 at the age of 86, Mathilde did make one return visit to Hannover in 1950. This was her first visit in more than 60 years. She discovered that the centre of Hannover had been destroyed in WW2 and that only the walls of her former home had survived. The church where she was christened was also just a shell.

Rosalie said that she was keen to tell the story of her grandmother. It gives a voice to a woman, who like many such women, made a quiet yet important contribution to the development of Australia.

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
