Carlo and Rocky - Judy Blaney's donkeys

Many members will remember Judy Blaney's presentation last year about training, caring for and describing the special characteristics about her two donkeys, Carlo and Rocky.

After Judy's health concerns, it was decided to gift the donkeys to a lady who is President of the Donkey Society of Queensland, and they were placed at her property at Moggill. Since then, they have achieved the next stage of their development and both are being ridden, bringing delight especially to children. However, there are a few remarkable GOOD NEWS stories about Carlo that are worth sharing about these beautiful animals.

The first story is that Carlo recently was guest of honour at a wedding, a wish come true for the bride who wanted a donkey in attendance. Carlo was a smash hit and all the guests thought so too.

The next story includes an experience that involved Carlo and one of our grandson's when we still had Carlo and Rocky at Plainland. The current owner wrote and shared the following article with Judy – and it is heartwarming!

CARLO – a magical donkey

"Every donkey we meet is special. I am lucky enough to own a few donkeys, including Carlo who has been with me since May 2024. I'd like to tell you about some of Carlo's special kind of magic.

I have a friend on disability who is also being treated for a sometimes-painful illness. She has spent regular time with my donkeys over the past 3 years and came over a few days ago for the first time in a couple of months. As she headed towards the donkeys, Carlo walked straight over to her and gently laid his head on her shoulder. He remained there for an unusually long time. I have never seen him do this before. Later my friend told me that her shoulder had been quite sore for a while. It was as though Carlo knew and was comforting her. She then told me that after he took his head off her shoulder, she realised the pain was gone! I was amazed and deeply moved.

When I relayed this to Carlo's former owner, she told me another wonderful story. About 2 years ago, she and her three-year-old grandson were brushing Carlo and his paddock mate Rocky in a small yard. Her grandson wandered off and started to open the gate. He was chastised, after which he stood near the gate with his head down. Carlo quietly walked over to the little boy and lifted his hat with his teeth to check that he was okay.

I am humbled to know the depth of perception and compassion shown by my little donkey Carlo. I've heard about dogs knowing when someone is sick and being able to locate the source of the sickness in the body, but not about donkeys. Now we know that donkeys can do it too. Is it possible donkeys also have healing powers? After these experiences with Carlo, I believe some of them do".

He is a self-confessed larrikin at heart and he not only enjoys wildlife but also having one. Some say he walks a fine line; others note, rarely is it a straight one.



Security for Seniors - 10 Golden Rules

☐ 1. Watch out for scams — scammers target you anytime, anywhere, anyhow. ☐ 2. Don't respond — ignore suspicious emails, letters, house visits, phones calls or SMS messages — press 'delete', throw them out, shut the door or just hang up. ☐ 3. Don't agree to an offer straight away — do your research and seek independent advice if it involves significant money, time or commitment, and get the offer in writing. ☐ 4. Ask yourself who you're really dealing with —scammers pose as people or organisations that you know and trust. ☐ 5. **Don't let scammers push your buttons** — scammers will play on your emotions to get what they want, including adopting a personal touch. ☐ 6. Keep your computer secure — always update your firewall, anti-virus and anti-spyware software, and only buy from a verified source. ☐ 7. Only pay online using a secure payment service — look for a URL starting with 'https' and a closed padlock symbol. □ 8. Never send money to someone you don't know and trust — it's rare to recover money from a scammer. □ 9. Protect your identity — your personal details are private and invaluable; keep them that way and away from scammers. □ 10. **If you've spotted a scam, spread the word!** — tell your family and friends, and report it to SCAMwatch. www.scamwatch.gov.au

And the girls all shouting round the ringside




