Lithuanian Christmas tales often centre on the magical and mystical events of Christmas Eve, known as $K\bar{u}\check{c}ios$, where the natural and spiritual worlds intertwine. These stories blend ancient pagan beliefs with Christian traditions and focus on family, reflection, and fortune-telling.

Key Lithuanian Christmas Tales and Beliefs

- The Talking Animals One of the most widespread tales is the belief that at the stroke of midnight on Christmas Eve, animals in the barn or stable are granted the temporary gift of human speech, as they were the only witnesses to the birth of Jesus. Many children in Lithuania would traditionally try to stay awake to hear their pets talk, though some traditions suggest that only Mary, Joseph, and the Christ child heard them, and overhearing them as a human might foretell doom or a divine message.
- **Spirits of the Departed** The $K\bar{u}\check{c}ios$ meal itself is a time to honor deceased relatives. It is believed that the souls of departed loved ones return to the family home on Christmas Eve. An empty place is often set at the table for them, with a candle lit on the plate to make their spirits feel welcome to join the family in the meal. The food is left on the table overnight for the spirits to feast.
- Fortune Telling Straws A popular activity, especially among young people, involves pulling a single, random piece of straw from under the white tablecloth after the meal. The nature of the straw is believed to predict one's future: a long straw suggests a long life; a thick one, a rich and happy life; and a bent straw, a change in one's path. Unmarried individuals also use this and other charms to predict when they might marry or the nature of their future spouse.



The fortune telling straws were then used to make Christmas Tree decorations.

• The White Reindeer/Elk Some traditions mention a white elk or reindeer that runs from the forest, bringing Christmas with it in the moonlight, a sight children might glimpse if they peer out the window late enough.

These narratives and traditions highlight the importance of family, remembrance, and a deep connection to nature and the mystical world during the Lithuanian Christmas season.
