President's Report January 2026

Guest Speaker

Introduced by David Hall, our guest speaker was local storyteller Lynne Strong, who spoke about why everyday stories matter, and why this community holds stories found nowhere else. Lynne spoke about how lived history can stay alive long after the last person who remembers it, and why recording these stories now makes a difference.

The presentation explored how seemingly ordinary experiences carry extraordinary decisions inside them. In Jamberoo, those decisions travelled far beyond the valley. One example came from the 1970s, during Australia's butter and margarine wars. Faced with a changing market, innovators at the Jamberoo factory drew on a long local tradition of cooperation and problem solving. Working from the belief that if you can't beat them, join them, Geoff Boxsell and Kevin Richardson created a butter that spread straight from the fridge. At the time, the law made it illegal to call it spreadable butter, so what began as a workaround became a breakthrough, an idea born in Jamberoo that went on to change how people around the world use a staple product every day.

This story sits within a much longer tradition. Jamberoo is recognised as the birthplace of the cooperative movement, where farmers chose collaboration over competition. That movement was given momentum by the local newspaper editor, who became a catalyst for change by writing under a nom de plume and arguing publicly for cooperation at a time when it was far from assured.

Another story came from local artist Jack Waugh, whose illustrations appeared in magazines across Australia and on the much-loved Arnott's Christmas biscuit tins. His work reached kitchens and lounge rooms nationwide, while its origins remained local. These stories invite pride.

They create connection.

They offer education, curiosity, and belonging.

The message was simple. Stories like these survive only when someone takes the time to record them. Once they are gone, they are gone for good.

Judging by the conversations afterwards, many members left thinking about the stories they know, and the ones they would hate to see lost.

Key takeaways

- Ordinary communities carry stories with national impact; Jamberoo is one of them
- History is shaped by everyday decisions, many of those stories are still sitting in people's heads
- Recording those stories is easier than ever, and you do not need to be famous to leave something worth keeping

Introduced by Kevin Gilbert, our Member Speaker was **Grahame Ramsay**.

Grahame, who was one of six children and born in Lithgow, showed us a cute AI version of his family. Apparently he considered himself the “black sheep” of his family but his siblings all vied for that title too!!

His father had been a school teacher, but suffering PTSD from his time in the Navy, could no longer work. Grahame's mother was forced to work. This included furthering her education and acquiring a scholarship to do post doctorate work in North Wales. Grahame had a great time travelling by ship first class to Wales, not having to learn Welsh and living on a farm.

Back in Australia, Grahame graduated from high school and enrolled in a university communication and media degree.

Grahame married Dorothea (a Teacher) in 1977 with Dot's father officiating in a “Dutch” Presbyterian Church, followed by a honeymoon in a tent at Avoca Beach!! Together Grahame and Dot had four children, enjoying travel as a family.

Grahame enjoyed a career in radio, working with Jenny Brockie and Caroline Jones, and moved into production, directing and writing for the ABC. He later worked at the University of Western Sydney lecturing in Media Studies. He went on to become National Education Manager at the National Trust... Grahame later also pursued other jobs which we may hear about another time.

Grahame talked about the importance of Christianity in his life ..starting in the Presbyterian Church, which became the Uniting Church, and later moving to the Anglican Church.

Grahame and Dot are now enjoying being grandparents and boasting about the youngsters' amazing talents...as we all do.... Being able to gaze upon them rather than having to nurture them!!



Financial Report: Bruce Johnston

Treasurer's Report - January 26 2026

Financial Year 10 January 2025 - 31 December 2025

1. End of Year Accounts have been prepared and sent to Auditor for Review on Feb 8th and will be presented in full at AGM on March 25th.
2. However, just as an indicator, Admin Income for the year was \$4,360.20, up \$174.87 on 2024.
3. After all Expenses overall Administration Surplus was \$24.78, down by \$296.63 from 2024. The \$270 drop was mainly due to increase in Capitation Fees from PSPL, increase in Software Licence Fee, Lodgement Fee for New Constitution and greater subsidy contribution towards Christmas Dinner event.
4. Events Income was \$67,513.00 for the Year and \$67,495.53 in costs, giving us a small Surplus of \$17.47 for the year.
5. After Xmas Subsidy from Admin Account, this ends up as a Surplus of \$317.47 in 2025 against a loss of \$807.58 in 2024. Events P&L will fluctuate Year on Year depending on how much pre-payment for events is collected in the end of the year and outgoings not appearing until the following year.
6. Combined Admin and Events Retained Earnings for the club was then \$342.25.
7. Members Accounts Receivable balance is \$-981.00 being credit balances for some members.
8. IMB Balance at Dec 31st was \$7,190.47.

Financial Year 01 January 2026 – 26 January 2026

1. Admin Income for Year of \$0 as only 3 weeks. Income usually does not start coming in until March. However, this year, due to a new PSPL requirement, we will be invoicing members for Annual Dues at the end of February so that all Annual Dues should be paid by March 31st.
2. Admin Expense for the Year of \$0 also so we have "broken even" so far in January.
3. So, our "Open" events are currently showing a Surplus of \$\$3,783 because we haven't had any costs yet, but that will change as soon as I start paying Invoices to venues.
4. IMB Bank Balance as of 27 January was \$8,577.47 of which \$3,903.09 is Admin Funds and \$4,647.38 Events Funds and Member Credits. Cash Tin \$114, Lucky Door Pool, \$162.15.
5. Accounts Receivable sits at -\$943.00, being members credits held.
6. No Accounts Payable.
7. We have 19 booked for Premier's Concert so one seat on bus is available. 15 for Shoalhaven Cruise, 16 for Human Nature, 15 for Some Enchanted Evening and 3 for Retford Park.



Budget and Annual Dues

The Management Committee has approved the Budget for next year and, as a result of increased costs and Capitation Fees, the Annual Membership Dues have been proposed to increase to \$45. The Standing Resolution to effect these changes will be put to the February Meeting for approval and, subject to Approval, will be invoiced at the end of February with payment due by March 31st.
