March Guest Speaker - Michael Headberry

Our Guest Speaker reminded us that ANZAC day owes its existence to Sir John Monash. Monash was born on June 27, 1865, on Dudley St West Melbourne to Prussian/Jewish parents. He spent 3 years around 1874 in Jerilderie where his father ran a general store, he attended Scotch College where he matriculated at 14! In 1881 he began an Arts degree. At 16 he was involved in extracurricular activities, but failed first year! But he was on the committee to start the University Union and commenced and edited the Melbourne University Review. By age 30 he had degrees in Arts, Law, a Master's in Engineering. He spoke German and French as well as English, but also Latin, Greek and Hebrew. In a letter to a cousin in USA he expressed his commitment to the nation of his birth, rather than his ancestry. From 1886, as the family provider, he worked on the Princess Bridge, Queen's Bridge, Merri Creek Bridge and was consulting engineer for the Outer Circle Railway and later the Harbour Trust. He established Monash and Anderson Consulting Engineers in the 1890's, after which he obtained a patent for the Monier system for reinforced concrete, and a partnership with cement producer David Mitchell of Lilydale. By 1914 when he volunteered for the Army, he was well off and well regarded. In 1885 he had joined the 4th Battalion and later the Citizen's Reservists - never went to Duntroon or Sandhurst. He received the Volunteer Colonial Officers Decoration as a Colonel. At this time, he was still developing his business, supporting his family, and was prominent with Boy Scouts, President of Melb Uni Graduates Association, President of the Vic. Institute of Engineers, Member of Melb Uni Council, Chairman of Luna Park and on the Rhodes Scholarship Selection Committee. A busy man! After leaving Gallipoli and the Middle East, he arrived in Europe as a Major General with the 3rd Division. He was promoted to Lieutenant General in 1918, and given command of the Australian Corps, which had 5 Divisions and for the first time – in Amiens - they fought together, previously having been under British commanders. Monash was renown for his ability to formulate battle plans which optimised the abilities of all three Services. Monash's losses averaged 5.7% killed compared with 18% for the whole of WW1. His meticulous planning and operations was demonstrated by the success at El Hamel, the plans for which have been used as examples in military planning and training. He was highly thought of in England and was knighted by King George V on August 12, 1918, at Château de Bertangles in France. This knighthood was a significant event, the first time in 200 years that a British monarch had knighted a commander on the battlefield. He received many awards - France, the Croix de Guerre, Legion of Honor, Belgium, Grand Officer of the Order of the Crown, USA Distinguished Service Medal, Britain Companion Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of Bath. However, Monash received scant

official recognition in Australia. In a 2 Hour speech to Parliament about the war, PM Billy Hughes did not mention Monash once. Monash wrote to the PM offering services in any capacity to the Government, but there was no reply for 9 months! Bob Carr has said the snubbing of Monash was one of the most distasteful events in Australian history. Efforts to recognise him with a posthumous promotion to Field Marshal are continuing. In 1919, he was put in charge of demobilisation. This was achieved in 8 months v's a 2 year schedule. He was appointed Chairman of the newly created Victorian SEC and he built Yallourn and wired Victoria for electricity, having insisted the SEC be publicly owned. He was President of the Naval and Military Club from 1921 until he died. He was honorary Chancellor of Melbourne University from 1923, a joint founder and second President of Melbourne Rotary, President of the Australasian Association for the Advancement of Science, and sat on many Boards. In 1921 a committee was set up for a WW1 commemorative construction. There were many strong proposals, but in 1927 at the ANZAC Day lunch, then Duke of York, Monash gave a rousing speech supporting the concept of the Shrine of Remembrance, achieved majority agreement and as an engineer figured largely in the building. He died before it was complete in 1934, at the age of 66 in 1931 from a heart attack. 30,000 people lined the streets, a third of the population of Melbourne. Summary by WL (John) Johnson)

Spotlight Speaker for March - Adrian Wallis

Our Spotlight Speaker was born in Greymouth on the West coast of South Island of New Zealand. The area produces gold, coal, and timber. There are farms and sawmills along the river Grey Valleys including the first sawmill set up in 1920 by Adrian's father. At 12, he was sent to a boarding school in Christchurch, followed by a Chemistry degree at Canterbury University for 7 years, emerging as a synthetic organic chemist. In 1965, he left for Canada with a postdoctoral scholarship to study alkaloid synthesis at McMaster Uni in Ontario. Next to London to study alkaloids of biological interest. Then he decided that forest product skills were needed in New Zealand, resulting in him becoming a consultant at Washington University in Seattle, where he spent '3 glorious years' studying wood structure, pulping etc. He then obtained an offer from Australia's CSIRO Division of Forest Products, a 3-year contract, extended to 55 years! He married 51 years ago and continues to live in East Malvern. Massive funding cuts to the CSIRO resulted in early retirement but he stayed as an Honorary Research Fellow for a further 10 years. One CSIRO project concerned a huge effort to synthesize liquid fuels from biomass – successful but uncompetitive. 30 years ago, there was much interest in forest pulp applications and the Government set up the National Pulp Mill Program in 1989, but no new industries have developed. The paperboard mills of Amcor and Visy are Australian owned but the CSIRO Division of Forest Products is no more. Australia is now a net importer of forest products.

One of Adrian's 32 grandparents was John Wallis. He made dissected maps and puzzles now called Jigsaw. Adrian has one dated 1812. An Armadale shop had one of his 1813 instructive games called 'The Naturalist' with a current local price of A\$14,500! John Wallis's son – Adrian's great grandfather – was an Oxford graduate who studied Hindi Sanskrit hoping to work in India. His wife contracted TB and they moved to Sydney, but she died. The son then returned to India and married a 15 yo whose son became Adrian's grandfather. He was educated in England, graduated as an agricultural scientist at Cirencester Agricultural College, then emigrated to Melbourne in 1871. He then started as a reporter on agricultural affairs for the Australasian newspaper and was appointed the first head of the Agricultural department in Victoria. He founded Dookie Agricultural College in the Goulburn Valley, now part of Melbourne University. After 10 years, he moved to New Zealand and took up the management of a large estate in Southland NZ, which is why Adrian was born in NZ! (Summary by WL (John) Johnson).
