




Paul Kearney – The History of Australian Early 1960s Rock & Roll songs



Paul Kearney's devotion to music began when he was four, learning the Suzuki method on piano. He went on to study classical piano and, at the age of 10, also began drum kit and percussion studies. He went on to study at the Victorian College of the Arts and to tour internationally in symphonic bands. After experimenting with computers and synthesizers for five years, he started to transport his love of composition to the electronic realm, composing and producing full time for five years. He has since built an impressive Melbourne-based studio facility. He has spent his time becoming technically proficient in both music production hardware and software. He has released an album, EP, done several tracks for widely respected compilations, whilst collaborating on several other artistic endeavours. Paul also performs regularly on his armoury of analogue gear. He lives with his wife and is becoming more interested in the popular music realm.

Paul will present the history and a selection of great old Aussie Rock & Roll songs and video clips from the early 1960s. Come with your toe-tapping shoes and listen to some old favourites such as Jimmy Little, the Bee Gees, Johnny Farnham, The Seekers and Slim Dusty.

Last Month's Speaker: Synopsis

Noel Phelan - The Navy at Gallipoli

The Royal Australian Navy (RAN) played a small, but significant, role in the Gallipoli campaign through the actions of two units, who both served with distinction – the submarine *AE2* and the Royal Australian Naval Bridging Train (RANBT). Indeed, the RAN was both “first in” and “last out” of Gallipoli in 1915.

“First in” during the early hours of 25 April 1915, was the submarine HMAS *AE2*, under the command of Lieutenant Henry Stoker. The *AE2* was the first allied submarine to successfully navigate the Dardanelles, a heavily mined strip of water separating the Gallipoli Peninsula from the rest of Turkey. *AE2* had orders to “run amok generally” in the Sea of Marmara and continued to attack Turkish ships until sunk on 30 April 1915 by the Turkish torpedo boat *Sultan Hissar*. The crew of 32 survived the sinking but were taken prisoner. Four crewmen died in captivity and the rest were released in 1918.

The RANBT was a unique unit of the RAN, formed in Melbourne in February 1915 and active only in the First World War for 2 years on Gallipoli and the Sinai. Under the command of Lieutenant Commander Leighton Bracegirdle, the RANBT arrived from Mudros on the Greek island of Lemnos to Suvla Bay, north of ANZAC Cove, to provide engineering support to the British offensive. From August to December 1915, while camped at Suvla Bay, on “Kangaroo Beach”, the 400 man Bridging Train carried out a variety of tasks including: building and maintaining wharves and piers; unloading stores from lighters; controlling the supply of fresh water to front line troops; building a light railway for stores movement; and carrying out repairs in an open-air workshop, all of which was undertaken under frequent enemy artillery fire and occasional air raids.

When the order was made to evacuate Gallipoli in late 1915, RANBT personnel were the final Australians to depart the Gallipoli Peninsula on 20 December 1915, thus becoming “last out”.

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The RANBT became Australia's most decorated Navy unit in WW1. A memorial to the unit can be found at the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne. A detailed diorama depicting the RANBT at Suvla Bay is on display at the Seaworks Maritime Museum in Williamstown, Victoria.

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4 February 2026: Light Rail & lunch at The Juniors Kingsford




