JUNE SPEAKER - Prof Mark Vickers

Today's speaker was an Auckland University researcher with the Liggins Institute where they study the health of babies from the womb to the tomb.

His brief, in short, was to study the health of the mother, her diet and its effect on the baby in her womb through birth, babyhood & adulthood and its effect on future generations. The Liggins Institute opened in 2001 and was named after its founder Sir Graham "Mont" Liggins. Its purpose was to study the effects of bad nutrition and how it is the cause of many of today's health problems from diabetes to heart disease, autism and annorexia.

The Institute experiments on mice, rats and sheep and has a research farm in Rotorua. In Auckland they have a staff of 52, plus 7 Professors and many administration personnel.

Nutrition and gut health is the answer to good health, beginning with breast milk for babies and eliminating sugar and sugary drinks and fast foods for children. Fresh fruit and vegetables are essential, along with exercise, fresh air and sunshine.

Looking back, I think we had all of these in our lives when we were growing up. We would also have heard the saying - 'you are what you eat.'




