The museum boasts the largest collection of antiquities in the Southern Hemisphere along with an eclectic collection of exhibits spread over four floors.

Meet at: Railway Square bus stop Stand M across from Central Station.

Time: 10.30am to arrive at the museum by 11am.

Getting there: By bus from Railway Square to the Victoria Park entrance to Sydney University (4 stops) and walk for about 5 minutes to the Museum entrance.

We'll arrive around 11am and wander around the Museum till lunch at 1pm.

Outback Queensland Tour

Celebrating the Success of the Outback Queensland Tour – June 2025 A Journey Through the Heart of Australia's Iconic Landscape

The Outback Queensland Tour has come to a triumphant close, leaving participants with unforgettable memories, newfound friendships, and a deeper appreciation for

the rugged beauty of Australia's interior. From rolling plains to starry evenings, this tour proved to be an extraordinary adventure that showcased the best of Outback Queensland.

The tour took travellers on a remarkable route through the heart of Queensland's Outback, offering an immersive experience of the region's natural splendour, rich history, and vibrant local culture. Stops included iconic landmarks such as Toowoomba, Roma, Dalby, Charters Towers, Augathella, Tambo, Blackall, Barcaldine, Ilfracombe and Longreach.

Each destination unfolded unique stories, we noted how clean and tidy these small country towns were kept.

Highlights of the Tour

- After overnighing at Dalby we visited Morven Museum, a perfectly restored older town, enjoyed a beautiful morning tea of scones, jam and a hot cuppa and a self-guided tour around the village.

The exhibit was staffed by volunteers and all proceeds of visits are reinvested in the village.

- Hotel Corones, located in Charleville, is a heritage listed hotel. It was built between 1924-1929 under the stewardship of Harry Corones. Harry was born in Greece and arrived in Australia in the early 1900s. Harry, a man on a mission, became a self-made man of considerable influence, predominately in the northern region of Queensland.

- While at Charleville we visited a Bilby exhibition and were provided with the plight of the Bilby and the efforts being undertaken to ensure its survival.
- We also visited The Cosmos Observatory, where we were treated to a 2-hour viewing of stars and planets. The night was crystal clear, and the viewing was excellent.

- We visited several small towns between Charleville and Longreach which included Augathella, Tambo, and Blackall.

Blackall is the home to one of Australia's Black Stumps and Jackie Howe, the fastest shearer ever with a conventional set of shears.

- Upon arrival at Longreach we enjoyed many treats. These included a Cobb & Co stagecoach ride reaching a full gallop for a short time.

- We backtracked a little to Barcaldine. For those members with a good understanding of Australian history, this town was the centre of the shearers’ strike in 1891. In the town centre there is a “Tree of Knowledge” which was standing during the strike. Unfortunately, the tree was poisoned in 2006 and consequently died. The skeletal remains of the tree have become a shrine in the middle of town.



Fortunately, a cutting from the tree was taken and the “young un” now resides in the local Barcaldine Workers Heritage Centre.

Returning to Longreach we had a drink stop in the Ilfracombe pub.

- A full day in Longreach followed. We visited The Stockman's Hall of Fame and were treated to a droving show that demonstrated the skill of drovers. Once again, we were treated to some exceptional Outback poetry. Then to the Qantas Museum where we were taken on a tour of several planes. We then enjoyed our farewell dinner at the Birdcage Hotel.
- The last day included a mystery tour of Camden Park, an 18K acre farm. We enjoyed lunch and were then transported to the Longreach Airport and flights back to Sydney.

I would like to thank the Probus members who joined the tour and who made the trip so much fun. Other people who joined the tour assimilated well and they enjoyed the tour as much as us.

Second Friday Book Club

A slower pace this month with *Tell Me Everything* by Elizabeth Strout.

It's autumn in Maine, and the town lawyer Bob Burgess has become enmeshed in an unfolding murder investigation, defending a lonely, isolated man accused of killing his mother. He has also fallen into a deep and abiding friendship with the acclaimed writer, Lucy Barton, who lives nearby in a house next to the sea. Together, Lucy and Bob talk about their lives, their hopes and regrets, and what might have been. Lucy,

meanwhile, befriends one of Crosby's longest inhabitants, Olive Kitteridge, now living in a retirement community on the edge of town. They spend afternoons together in Olive's apartment, telling each other stories about people they have known.

Some of the group relished the detailed examination of relationships and enjoyed the characters, especially Bob. Others found the intricacy and number of relationships (there are many ex-wives and ex-husbands) a little too complex. This novel builds characters from previous Elizabeth Strout novels, so sometimes the back stories were a little hard to comprehend.

The book illuminates the ways in which our relationships keep us afloat. As Lucy says, "Love comes in so many different forms, but it is always love."

Answer to Maths Puzzle

The answer is that 1 pencil costs 12 cents.

Strategy: Reason Logically

2 pencils and 3 pens cost 78c. 	3 pencils and 2 pens cost 72c. 	Together, these sets cost $78c + 72c = 150c$. 
The combined set of 5 pencils and 5 pens costs 150c. We can group them into 5 pen-pencil pairs. 	If 5 pen-pencil pairs cost 150c, 1 pen-pencil pair costs $150c \div 5 = 30c$. 	2 pen-pencil pairs would cost $30c \times 2 = 60c$. 
We know that 3 pencils and 2 pens cost 72c. We just worked out that 2 pencils and 2 pens cost 60c. The difference between these combinations is 1 pencil. Therefore 1 pencil must cost $72c - 60c = 12c$.
