I had not planned to have a medical misadventure and end up in North Shore Hospital literally 4 hours before the committee meeting.

Secondly I must thank Carolyn (and others) who I understand made the June monthly meeting a memorable one with a remote presentation by cardiologist Patrick Gladding. I was looking forward to this presentation but ironically I was in hospital having a pacemaker fitted.

The mid year lunch held at the Collins in Greenhithe was a success. Thanks Carolyn for organising the venue and selection of meals. It is not an easy task to organise something like this due to the human factor which covers a wide range of things. Carolyn has great patience (and frustration) but comes through with flying colours which she has shown over the 5 years of the clubs existence.


Next month, August, we have James Duncan from MOTAT returning for his 3rd and final instalment of Trams in Auckland. I have been advised by MOTAT personal that he gave over 60 presentations last year.

Many people have asked why I ended up in North Shore Hospital recently, so to not having to repeat the story many more times I thought I would enlighten you. On June 9th I went to make a cup of tea. I remember pressing the lever on the electric jug and then waking up on the tiled floor wondering what the heck had happened. There was blood over the floor from where my head had hit a drawer handle – bent the handle to about 45 degrees and severely damaged my head. I crawled into the bedroom and pressed the Emergency button. In next to no time a nurse from my village – Ryman Keith Park - arrived who then called the ambulance who transported me to North Shore Hospital at no cost due to me paying an annual subscription. The diagnosis was that my heart had stopped for a brief period of time and was running slow and irregularly. The cure was to install a pacemaker. However, I had badly hurt my left elbow, a rather large lump on the back of my head and broken bones at the base of my neck – C5 and C6. Having the pacemaker installed was no problem. The biggest problem is the broken bones in my neck. 6 weeks since the fall I am still feeling neck pain which necessitates me to wear a neck brace for a couple of hours a day even though I had been wearing it continuously for 4.5 weeks. Physio will be continuing for some time. I had a very good experience over the 7 days I had in the North Shore Hospital – no complaints despite what I have heard from others. I am certainly pleased also with my experience in the Ryman Keith Park Village and the St John Ambulance. Looks like I made the right decisions for my future.

Geoff Hickman has contributed this interesting article about the history of Limeburner's Bay in Hobsonville. Thanks Geoff.



Further to the brief history of Hobsonville in the November 2024 Probian, here is a little about the major industry in the area for over 65 years. From 1863 to 1929, Limeburners Bay was the site of two major West Auckland brickworks - R. O. Clark's and Joshua Carder's. The Pleistocene clay that had been used by brickmakers and potters along the Whau River was no longer available in large quantities, but a pocket near what is now Clark road and Scott Road encouraged Rice Owen Clark Snr to experiment making drain pipes, known as field tiles, to use on his farm. He wrapped moist clay in a continuous spiral around small tree trunks, cut them lengthwise on opposite sides, dried and burnt them in a wood fire. This led to the impressive Clark clay works in Hobsonville until 1927 when the works closed and transferred to New Lynn. This involved the cartage of many materials including 50 tonnes of corrugated iron taken from the clay works that had covered nearly a hectare. Lime was also an important part of the brick making process. Shells from the beach were spread over the bricks stacked in the kilns, where the intense heat caused them to calcify. Even before the brickworks, however, there had been lime kilns in the area. Hence the name Limeburners Bay.
