James is obviously very passionate about trams having been involved with them from an early age and continues to do so to this day. He still regularly drives the MOTAT trams. In the past 12 months he advised me that he had given 65 presentations (that is over one a week) to clubs such as Probus.

The format for the August meeting was changed to accommodate James due to his 1 hour (1.25 hours) presentation. This proved to work well and who cared if the presentation went over time – it was well worth it.

The layout of the room for the meeting was also changed to make use of the large TV screen and sound system. This was also a success due to the size of the screen and the sound system which I understand even the hearing impaired could hear. We may use this layout in the future if the committee approves.

There were a number of visitors for the August meeting with 6 application forms picked up, 4 of who expressed firm interest.

The Club's committee has now met to review changes to the Constitution and Standing Resolutions as recommended by an independent committee of 4 of the Hobsonville Probus Club members. Following this review by the Club committee the changes have been sent to PSPL (Probus South Pacific Ltd) for approval. Once PSPL approval has been gained we will be going through the process of changing the Constitution and Standing Resolutions. The Club's committee will be also recommending that we become an Incorporated Society.



The Old Mill at Riverhead

Only a short distance from Hobsonville Point as the crow flies, but a little further by road, lies the historic village of Riverhead which played a large part in the European history of Auckland dating back to the 1840's. The Riverhead area had several natural advantages; it was readily accessible from Auckland by sea when road access was very limited, it had an ample supply of fresh water from the Wautaiti Stream, and there were large Kauri forests in the area.

- **1844**: European settlement began with the establishment of a *kauri timber mill*, taking advantage of Riverhead's strategic location at the head of the Waitematā Harbour. Fresh water for driving the mill machinery was conveyed from the stream to the mill site via an overhead wooden aqueduct.
- **1860s**: The timber mill was converted into a *flour mill*, which became the largest in the wider Auckland region. This transformation helped Riverhead develop into a thriving community.
- Late 1800s: The site evolved again this time into a *paper mill*. By 1895, it merged with two South Island mills to form the New Zealand Paper Mill Company Limited, aiming to survive fierce competition.
- 1923: Operations were consolidated and the Riverhead mill was closed, with production shifting to Mataura in the South Island. At its peak, it was New Zealand's second-largest paper manufacturer.

Today, while the original mill structures are long gone, the legacy remains embedded in Riverhead's identity — a town shaped by timber, flour, and paper.

The remains of the mill foundations are located on the banks of the river adjacent to where the road bridge crosses the river, and there is a public path leading from a reserve and under the road to the mill site. The mill area itself is fenced off because of the dangerous nature of the mill foundations, but the structure can be readily discerned.

	lan has been member of Supporters of Tiritiri Matangi for 25 years, regular weekly guide for 13 years, involved with various Biodiversity projects, and presenter to many Auckland service clubs and community organisations on Tiritiri Matangi conservation efforts. His career has been at senior management level in Local Government and Public Companies, holding many roles from Company Secretary to CEO. Experienced in management, governance, finance, marketing, HR, property and relationships. Ian has a doctorate in Business Management, am a Winston Churchill Fellow, and a member of the Institute of Directors. Outside of my career, my involvement has been in community organisations, including periods in excess of 35 years in both Scouting NZ and NZ School Trustees Association. Ian has held office bearer positions in these and many other groups at local, regional and national level including as treasurer, auditor and president. Ian is willing to provide the governance leadership this role requires and to contribute to the continuing successful conservation efforts on Tiritiri Matangi Island.
October 20	Dr Jill Dobbie, UoA At school, I excelled in Sciences and discovered my love of Computer Science. I went on to study Applied Engineering at undergraduate and postgraduate level, with a focus on computing and process control. After my undergraduate degree I spent a couple of years in industry working for PEC, programming in assembly language. My PhD research addressed theoretical aspects of database systems. I was one of the first women to complete a PhD in Computer Science at the University of Melbourne.
	My current research focuses on machine learning, in particular data stream mining and adversarial attacks. My research group creates algorithms that can be used in various application areas, such as predicting peaks and troughs in COVID-19 cases, predicting dementia using routinely collected data, monitoring critical and/or remote sensors, and detecting and defending against various adversarial attacks.
