CHAT ABOUT BOOKS


THE WIDOWS OF CHAMPAGNE by Renee Ryan

I recently enjoyed this book, reading it in three days, when I had time. The story is about war torn France during WWII and is centred in the wine growing district of Reims. It features a wine growing family of three widows.

Josephine: Grandmama, and matriarch of the family who is suffering the signs of oncoming old age and is not coping with all the stress of her beloved husband's dynasty being ravished by the German occupation.

Helene: daughter of Josephine, a onetime heiress and beauty, who is singled out by Herr Helmut von Schmidt, a Nazi High German official, to entertain his cronies in the luxury of the famous château. She is eventually coerced into becoming Herr Schmidt's reluctant lover and hostess.

Gabrielle: Helene's daughter, who cannot allow the Nazis to overcome and ruin their beloved family estate. She manages to secrete thousands of expensive fine bottled wines in a hidden cave, thus outwardly showing their complicity to Herr Schmidt's instructions to supply the Nazi's demand for France's finest and most expensive wine.

The bravery shown by those 'lost' nurses and by Vivian and the other women she met and worked with in the several prison camps they were sent to was revealed and honoured as the play held the audience spell bound for almost two hours. Tears were shed!

After the performance about half the group moved out of the beautiful new foyer upstairs to the Hall of Remembrance and then along the upper walkways to watch the Last Post ceremony – another moving experience especially for those have never seen it before.
