#### CHAT ABOUT BOOKS

#### THE LITTLE WARTIME LIBRARY by Kate Thompson

What a fascinating insight into a unique World War Two story! Set in Bethnal Green, London, and based on true events, it reveals so much about the lives, relationships, sufferings and joys of East Enders throughout the war.

After the Bethnal Green Library was hit early in the Blitz, resourceful locals 'colonised' the disused Tube station and this amazing community lived out the war underground with 5000 locals sleeping on bunks and the community growing to include a 300 seat theatre, café, health support, children's nursery, mobile hairdresser, and famously the Library. Clare Button and Ruby Munroe, close friends though such different characters, are the heart and soul of the Library and are tested to their limits in their efforts to provide something very special to this diverse community. Resistance from Library hierarchy, difficult husbands, rules and regulations, is met with determination, persistence and sometimes devious strategy to enable the children, women and even some men to find solace, entertainment, education, distraction and escape from the bombs.

The characters of Clare and Ruby are developed throughout the novel as they face personal challenges in their complex roles and relationships. Clare is a young widow, a trained children's librarian in a man's world and only allowed to pursue her goals because the men are at war. Ruby, best described perhaps as a 'good time girl' has a strength of character and her own set of ethics that sustain her throughout as she comes to terms with a tragedy in her own recent past. Will these brave, resourceful

women find love and rewarding futures as the war crawls to an end? You'll have to read it to find out. You won't be able to put it down - but keep the tissues handy!

At the end of the story there are a series of articles relating to the actual wartime underground Bethnal Library that are as interesting as the novel itself.

**Don't skip this section.** Interviews with some survivors who had lived in the underground, then known as an Iron Lung, provide a very real context to the novel. The author also reports on the many interviews she had with librarians while researching the book. My favourite quotation in this section is by Bernard Kops, British playwright and poet:



.... The reference library where my thoughts were to rage.

I ate book after book, page after page,
I scoffed poetry for breakfast, novels for tea.

I scoffed poetry for breakfast, novels for teal And plays for my supper. No more poverty. Welcome young poet, in here you are free To follow your star to where you should be.

"Libraries are part of what it is to be human. It is one of our greatest human achievements. We should nurture them and support them." Kathleen Mine, Librarian in The Hebrides who services her libraries by ferry.

This is all so relevant when our own libraries seem to be under threat of cutbacks today!

# **MORE CHAT ABOUT BOOKS**


#### THE MITFORD GIRLS by Mary S Lovell

There have been many biographical accounts of this fascinating, infamous family - Lord David Redesdale and Lady Sydney Redesdale/Mitford and their six daughters

and one son: Nancy, Pamela, Thomas, Diana, Unity, Jessica and Deborah.

This British minor aristocratic family, very socially conservative, believed daughters "came out" and married, however many of the daughters wanted to go to school, be educated and maybe university. Shock horror! Whenever the subject of school was raised their father David's mantra was "you are not a boy, only males are educated."

David was hugely eccentric, prone to loud rages when anyone disagreed with him; even dinner guests experienced his unbelievable rages.



Diana, the third daughter, did the correct thing – at the age of 19, she married Bryan Guinness the heir to the Guinness fortune. However this marriage was short lived lasting two children and three years. In 1932 Diana met Oswald Mosley the fascist "Black Shirt" leader, became madly in love with him and to the horror of her parents, divorced Bryan Guinness.

During this period the fourth daughter Unity, at the age of 17, had become obsessed with Adolph Hitler and his policies. She managed to talk her parents into letting her do her "finishing year" in Germany. During this year she almost stalked Hitler, attending all his political/propaganda rallies and making sure she would be at the restaurant where he always had lunch, giving the Nazi salute as he passed. Eventually Hitler noticed her continual attendance and invited Unity to dine with him. Over the following years Unity became personally involved with Hitler (although not sexually) spending many hours privately in his company.

During the next eight years Diana also became a confident of Hitler through her connection with her sister Unity, as well as being the lover of the fascist Mosley, and becoming an intimate confident of Hitler and many of the Nazi party members.

Diana and Mosley were secretly married in the drawing room at the home of Goebbels. Hitler was a witness. It is thought that because both Diana and Unity would often dine with their cousin Winston Churchill, Hitler may glean some secret British information. At this time the second youngest daughter Jessica "Decca" becomes obsessed with communism, elopes with Winston Churchill's nephew to fight in the Spanish Civil War and goes on to become a staunch member of the Communist Party

in America, remaining in America and a member of the party her entire life.

This is a fascinating family, with many tragedies and strong determined women.

A huge read but well worth it.




