
About the speaker -

With a burgeoning interest in Bushranger History, John researched and published two books on Ben Hall, arguably Australia's greatest bushranger.

His first book, "Ben Hall's Treasure" was released in 2014, followed by his second book, "Ben Hall's Last Days" in 2016.

After several years of studying bushranger history, John was mesmerised by the legendary life of Frederick Ward, known as Captain Thunderbolt.



After two years researching Thunderbolt, including many visits to the New England region, where the man known as "The Gentleman Bushranger "roamed, John produced his latest work: "Captain Thunderbolt's Folly".







## A Walk down Memory Jane ... by Carol Duane

While recovering in rehabilitation hospital, I've continued researching wartime shipping after the May Guest Speaker Mr Plowman, stirred my curiosity to learn more, especially about the Allied Merchant Navy, because my Father and his brother were Merchant Marine sailors in WW11

The Allied Merchant Navy was manned by sailors from Britain and the many nations that made up the then British Empire. Countries such as Russia, the United States and China which became British Allies were also members of the Merchant Navy.

Though the importance of the Allied Merchant Navy in WW11 seems to be rarely mentioned I've learnt that the merchant seamen, although they did so as civilians, faced the same dangers of war as the regular armed forces. The merchant ships were peacetime vessels fitted with guns for defence - although this weaponry could not withstand an enemy attack.

The job of the Merchant Navy was to carry vital troops, food, fuel and equipment to wherever they were needed in the fight against the Axis alliance of Germany, Italy and Japan.

As an island country, the United Kingdom was highly dependent on imported goods. Britain required more than a million tons of imported material per week in order to survive and fight and much of it came from Australia.

During my research it has been a surprise to also learn -

- \* 2,603 allied merchant ships were sunk during WW11; 30,248 allied merchant seamen died
- \* Some German warships and submarines were very close to the USA coastline during WW11

\* The merchant marine sailors were very **brave**, sailing on ships with almost no defence in an effort to try to ensure necessary cargo was delivered

\* Passengers as well as cargo were transported on merchant marine ships

\* Most of the passengers from Australia were going to England - Would you want to **sail** on what was basically an **unprotected cargo ship** on a **long sea voyage** from Sydney, across the Pacific and through the Panama Canal into the Atlantic Ocean - IN **WAR TIME**?

My father and one of his brothers were crew members on the SS Ulysses, a merchant marine ship providing much needed goods to Australia and the USA and United Kingdom.

There is an interesting, but very long story about the full history of the SS Ulysses and it last voyage However, to save space, here is just the brief account -

The **SS Ulysses** had survived many incidents but her luck ran out when she was **torpedoed** by a German U Boat (U-160) off the coast of Carolina, USA

Three torpedoes hit the ship but she settled slowly providing enough time for the life boats to be lowered.

Even though hundreds of ships were bombed during WW11, the SS Ulysses became news, especially in the USA.

Photos were taken by a US aircraft which first reached the scene

Passengers later reported that there was no panic, women and children boarded the lifeboats first, the crew were efficient.

The Captain refused to leave the ship until everyone else was in a life boat.

The lifeboats pulled away before the ship sank. It was the last voyage for the Ulysses.

The presence of an aircraft (possibly a flying boat) probably led to the early departure of U-160.

An hour or so later, the destroyer, USS Manley, arrived, scrambling nets were lowered and the 290 survivors were brought up on deck.





My uncle often told me about the sinking and being saved by kind and generous American sailors on the USS Manley, who gave up their own beds and their own clothing for the comfort of the Ulysses passengers and crew.

What surprised me the most was recently seeing this photo and

realising how small a ship she actually was. I had always pictured a large USS Navy ship when my uncle spoke about the USS Manley.

We can only wonder how they managed to fit 290 survivors onto this small ship which already had a full crew onboard.

For some unknown reason, the story of the Ulysses captured the imagination of the American public It was front page news >

Many passengers reported how the officers and crew of the US Navy ship treated them with the greatest kindness and this kind treatment and generosity was repeated in Charleston and New York by the community.

For the rest of his life, my uncle would never hear a bad word said about Americans after how he had been so kindly and generously treated by them after his ship was attacked and sank.



One notable act of kindness was that Baroness Rothschild took every passenger to Macy's store in New York for replacement shoes.

A **mother cat** onboard the SS Ulysses was the **only casualty**, she went down with the ship, however her 3 kittens were saved by an 11 year old girl passenger who wrapped them inside her coat and carried them into the lifeboat.

I must admit it felt a bit spooky to learn that the SS Ulysses was attacked on April 11<sup>th</sup> 1942 and sank just after midnight on April 12<sup>th</sup> 1942 because I was born exactly 5 years later - after midnight on April 12<sup>th</sup> 1947 (For Eels footy fans - that is also the date of their very first Game!)

## How to make the best-ever scrambled eggs by Australia's Best Recipes Team

While scrambled eggs seem very simple, it's pretty easy to end up with dry eggs.

Follow these steps to ensure you perfect you eggs and become the scrambled eggs master.

#### Step 1

Whisk two eggs with a little milk or cream and salt, and pepper. If you want to add any additional flavours, such as parsley, corn or smoked salmon, have these ready to go.

#### Step 2



Melt a knob of butter in a non-stick pan. When it's sizzling, add the eggs and, using a wooden spoon, gently fold the mixture until creamy curds have formed.

Turn off the heat before the eggs are fully set.

#### Step 3

Add any additional flavours just before the last curds form, and let the eggs sit in the pan until the curds have JUST set. Then, slide onto a plate and serve warm.
