Meet Lee Sweet

Lee Sweet joined the Bilgola Plateau Probus Club about 18 months ago, inspired by a desire to learn Mah-jong. She wasn't alone — a few of her friends from an exercise class also wanted to give it a go. The idea took root thanks to Patricia Ryan, founder of the club and a fellow classmate, who encouraged them with a persuasive, "Come on girls, you need to join up!"

That struck a chord with me too — I joined the club the same way, thanks to Patricia (although from a different exercise class, a few years earlier). It seems many roads lead to Patricia and Probus!

Lee began by attending an event as a guest on a trip to Cabramatta before deciding to officially become a member. Although she's lived on the Northern Beaches for nearly two decades and already had a strong circle of friends, the Probus Club has brought new connections, camaraderie, and plenty of activities to enjoy.

Lee has led an adventurous life, rich with travel and experience. Born in Brisbane, she moved with her family to the country near Toowoomba at the age of five or six. Her father and uncle ran a dam-sinking business, and they lived in a remote area where there was no electricity. They relied on wood fires, and it was so cold in winter that water would freeze in the taps. Despite what sounds like harsh conditions today, Lee says it was a wonderful way to grow up. The family later returned to Brisbane, where she finished her schooling.

Her first job was as a window dresser in a frock shop, but her heart was set on the skies. At 20 — the minimum age to apply — she applied to be a flight attendant with TAA. The maximum height for flight attendants at the time was 5 feet 8 inches, and at 5-foot $8\frac{1}{2}$, her career was nearly aborted before it began! With a subtle softening of the knees, she passed the test and hoped they wouldn't notice when, later on, she grew another two and a half inches.

After leaving TAA Lee flew with Ansett Airlines and during that time had a 12-month secondment with Air Italia, a highlight of her 30-year career. Being a flight attendant in those days was a very different job from what it is today, with countless hours of detailed safety training using manuals the size of the old Sydney telephone book. But once in the air there was a real sense of freedom and independence - and no boss breathing over your shoulder. Lee recalls many moments that tested her composure, including a bomb threat (fortunately a hoax). She's quick to reassure nervous flyers that air travel is far safer than driving. Next time I'm gripping the armrest during take-off, I'll try to channel some of Lee's calm confidence!

These days, Lee still travels — but now as a passenger. When home, she enjoys Mah-jong, walking, and exercise classes...especially the coffee afterwards!

DI'S BOOKCLUB REVIEWS

THE NIGHTINGALE by KRISTIN HANNAH

(review by Di Cross)

Many of Kristin's novels are based on her belief that women's stories are all too often forgotten or overlooked. In this novel the story revolves around 2 sisters during WWII in France. who face unimaginable horrors and make impossible choices as they fight to protect their loved ones and countrymen. Despite their differences, sisters Viann and Isabelle have always been close.

The characters in The Nightingale are fictional, although some of their actions are based on real historical figures. It begins with a backstory of an elderly woman in Oregon planning to return to France with her son. At that time we don't know what her role was in World War II, but figure it was highly traumatic.

Two sisters lost their mother when they were young. Their father is a World War I veteran-traumatized, distant, almost indifferent to their lives. Elder sister, Viann is content with life in the French countryside with her husband Antoine and their daughter as a mother, wife, teacher, and homemaker. When War breaks out, Antoine is sent off to fight and Viann finds herself isolated. She doesn't believe that the Nazis will invade France...but invade they do, in droves of marching soldiers, in caravans of trucks and tanks, in planes that fill the skies and drop bombs upon the innocent. When a German captain and later a Gestapo or SS officer requisitions Viann's home, she and her daughter must live with the enemy or lose everything.

The younger Isabelle, is a rebellious eighteen-year-old who is shipped off to various finishing schools where she can't seem to finish because of her rowdy insubordination. Isabelle escapes from another school and tries to re-join her father who owns a bookstore in Paris. Isabelle meets a partisan who believes the French can fight the Nazis from within France, and she falls in love. But when he betrays her, Isabelle joins the Resistance risking her life, time and again to save others. Isabelle is a strikingly beautiful, using this to overcome some difficult and dangerous situations

Isabelle and an experienced mountaineer form an escape route into Spain over the Pyrenees with downed Allied airmen. This story was based on the Comet line of 24-year-old Andree de Jongh, a Belgian woman who helped aviators and others escape.

Hannah's writing is emotional and gripping. You are dragged into the lives of normal French people living under Nazi rule. Summers are very hot and winters deadly cold, clothes in taters giving no warmth; no electricity or timber for fires and virtually no food. Friends and neighbours turning each other in for money or food. The depiction of the horrors of war - violence, loss, betrayal - feels real and heartwrenching. Yet, The Nightingale is also a story about the quiet, unspoken acts of bravery that often go unnoticed in the grand sweep of history. It is about how women, in their strength and resilience, held the fabric of society together, even when everything else was falling apart. You feel their pain, their heartbreak, and their determination to survive.

It will leave you in tears, but also with a deep respect for the resilience of those who lived through unimaginable horrors. It's a book that stays with you long after you've turned the last page, a haunting reminder of the cost of war and the strength of those who endure it.

Men tell stories. Women get on with it. For us it was a shadow war. There were no parades for us when it was over, no medals or mentions in history books. We did what we had to during the war, and when it was over, we picked up the pieces and started our lives over."

THE HAPPIEST MAN ON EARTH by Eddie Jaku

In WWII Eddie was imprisoned in Buchenwald and Auschwitz concentration camps.

In 1945 he was rescued by allied soldiers. He always considered himself a German first and a Jew second. But it all changed in 1938 when he was beaten, arrested and faced many horrors. He lost family, friends and his country. Because he survived he made a vow to smile every day and pays tribute to those who were lost, by telling his story. Eddie and family moved to Sydney, Australia in 1950. Despite everything he endured he believes he is the happiest man in earth. I found this book heartbreaking but shows how one can rise above horrifying conditions. The book was published when Eddie was 100 yrs old.

FLOWERS FROM ALGERNON

(review by Steve Jones)

Daniel Keyes (1927 - 2014) was an American author best known for his profoundly moving and psychologically rich novel, Flowers for Algernon.

Keyes, whose output was sparse, worked as a ship's purser, then edited pulp magazines and writing for Atlas Comics, the precursor to Marvel Comics. Later, he taught creative writing, and in 1966 he became an English and creative writing professor at Ohio University and later honoured as a professor emeritus in 2000.

Flowers for Algernon began as a short story in 1959 (Hugo Award Winner) and was later expanded into a full-length novel in 1966 (Nebula Award Winner). It is all about Charlie Gordon, a man with an intellectual disability who undergoes an experimental procedure to increase his intelligence-with deeply emotional and philosophical consequences.

Written in diary format, the story follows Charlie's progress, from his time as a floor sweeper in a bakery where he is the butt of everyone's jokes. But he dreams of becoming smarter and undergoes an experimental surgery designed to dramatically increase his intelligence, which had previously been tested only on a lab mouse named Algernon, who becomes extraordinarily intelligent.

Via Charlie's progress reports, written up as a diary, first in very simple and phonetically narrative before the surgery, but after the surgery, the diary reports increase in perception and depth.

As Charlie's IQ rises to genius level, he begins to understand the world-and the people around him-in ways he never could before. He experiences joy, heartbreak, alienation, and ultimately a tragic reversal as the effects of the surgery begin to fade.

Flowers for Algernon remains a very powerful and emotional read. Charlie's transformation is not just intellectual - it's empirical. His journey forces readers to confront uncomfortable truths about how we value intelligence and disabilities. In my humble opinion it should be mandatory reading at every high school.

The novel was adapted into the Oscar-winning film Charly (1968), where Cliff Robertson won the Best Actor Oscar and later a TV movie in 2000.








