GUEST SPEAKER

Today's guest speaker was Probus member Angela who delighted members with her description of the little-known *Palazzo Davanzati* in Florence, a venue often neglected by tourists to this famous Italian city.

In 2023 she and husband Graham undertook their grand tour of Italy after an absence of 35 years. Angela acknowledged that Florence has always been her favourite city and as tourists they explored all the well-known tourist attractions such as the Uffizi, il Duomo, and the Ponte Vecchio but in their walk around the city they came across a gem amongst gems.

Angela said of this gem "If I were a real estate agent, I would present this property to you as follows: Location, Location, Location! This Palazzo is in the heart of Florence and with three storeys of 'Palazzo' it would satisfy any discerning buyer. Its features include:

- 3 bedrooms all with ensuites!
- A study
- Ample living and dining accommodation
- Kitchen, laundry, and staff quarters with dumb waiter to all floors
- Off street parking, and
- A security system."



Not a modern, contemporary home but rather one built in the 14th century. *Palazzo* in Italian can mean a royal palace but more commonly it is used to describe a substantial family residence, of which this Palazzo is an example.

Palazzo Davanzati was built in the second half of the 14th century by the Davizzi family, who were wealthy members of the Wool Guild. Florence was and still is famous as a centre for wool and silk textile manufacture. In Medieval and Renaissance Florence, there were twenty-one guilds with six representatives from these guilds elected to sit on the Signoria, the body that once governed Florence. These guilds and their members were wealthy and, where there is wealth there is a need for bankers. Enter the Medici family and from their involvement and influence the Italian Renaissance was born.

The Davizzi family would have been considered an upper middle-class family but not a noble family. Such families usually aspired to the nobility through strategic marriages. In 1578 the palazzo was purchased by the rich mercantile family, the Davanzati. The house remained in the Davanzati family until1838. With the unification of Italy from 1861 to 1871, the temporary capital of Italy was established in Florence. The Risorgimento or 'resurgence" as it was called resulted in the demolition of many medieval buildings to make way for new buildings befitting of a new capital.

Palazzo Davanzati by sheer good fortune escaped the wrecking ball and today remains a prime example of mediaeval architecture.

By the mid-1800s the Palazzo had become a tenement housing several poor families. In the late 1800s an antiquarian dealer by the name of Elia Volpi, recognized the historical significance of the building; he purchased it, and it was subsequently restored.



In 1910, Volpi opened the building as a private museum called the "Museum of the Ancient Florentine House". Later purchased by the State in 1951 it was reopened to the public with a display of objects from Florentine Gallery collections to which donations of majolica, furnishings, lace, and embroidery were added over time.

In 1995 the museum needed to be closed for major structural

the museum partially reopened in 2005 with the ground floor and first floor accessible; by 2012, all the floors were once again open to visitors. Angela provided images of the various floors and their displays, wall paintings and furnishings.





The building was constructed in sandstone, with three large portals and three stories of mullioned windows. The top-most floor has a loggia that was added in the 16th century. The façade displays the Davanzati coat of arms and has traces of other decorations. The interior courtyard has 14th century-style arches, vaults, and capitals.

In exploring the interior tourists enter the ground floor room and atrium through one of three large portals. This area was used to conduct business and presently displays objects and information related to the history of the building.

All the rooms of the building communicate onto hallways that open onto a central courtyard. Carriages could be brought into the courtyard and hence, your off-street

parking!



On the first floor is the Great Hall, this large room was also used for conducting business. Its large windows are located street-side. There are three square holes with wooden covers that align with the openings of the atrium below. These holes were used to observe who was walking in, and for defense purposes. Medieval family were, like those of today, often at the risk of home invasion. Their homes contained, money, jewels, and precious objects of art.

Bowling ball size balls of stone could be dropped through the floor openings onto the intruders found lurking in the atrium below. If, however you killed the intruder you would have to pay the intruder's family compensation!

The room is now set up as a museum with various 16th-century objects on display and one wall displays derogatory anti Medici graffiti. Rebellious youth no doubt!


gropping stone balls the size of bowling balls through these train doors onto the intruder below. T catch was that if you killed the intruder you would have to pay compensation to his/her family!

The first floor contains Sala dei Pappagalli (The Room of the Parrots) with wall paintings designed to look like patchwork and wall-hangings lined with miniver, with motifs of parrots painted or embroidered on the blocks. These

paintings have been restored from the original frescoes. A large fireplace dominates this room, and it is currently set up with a bed and cradle. In addition is a row of coat of arms of families allied with the Davizzi. A small bathroom or ensuite

had indoor plumbing for visitors.









The bedroom on the second floor is called the Chatelain of Vergy in honour of the frescoes inspired by The *Châtelaine de Vergy,* a medieval romance full of courtly love, adventure, and death. These frescoes were painted to commemorate the wedding of a daughter to a nobleman. Upward mobility!





Located on the third floor are the Camera delle Impannate, another bedroom, and the kitchen. The impannate were cotton or linen textile panels that were dipped in coloured wax and put in a wood frame to be inserted in the windows as a substitute for glass, which was very expensive at the time.



The kitchen is located on the top floor because the hot air rising from cooking stayed away from the lower living spaces in the heat of summer, and to minimize damage in the event of an out-of-control fire. The room features a fireplace with bellows and two turnspits, a wooden bread-kneading machine, a metal butter churn, and other tools dating from the Renaissance period or later. There is a dumbwaiter that services all floors so that food and water could be sent down to the dining rooms and bathrooms. Cisterns underneath the palazzo collected the rainwater that came

into the atrium, to be used for drinking and ablutions. The servants' quarters were housed on the loggia level on very top floor. The loggia also allowed the family to escape the heat of the day, of an evening and catch the cool evening breezes.





A 13th Century French Quilt was also displayed at *Palazzo Davanzati* depicting scenes from Tristian and Isolde.





A definite surprise with the discovery of an historical and authentically restored building, somewhat off the beaten tourist tract, and away from the crowds and constant need to queue for tickets on a hot summer's day in Florence.






