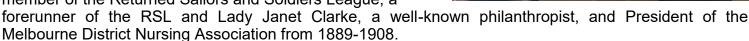


GUEST SPEAKER

Today's guest speakers were Kerry Rendell and Michelle Cannon, both from Bolton and Clarke.

After a brief introduction to the services provided by Bolton Clarke as Australia's largest independent, not-for-profit aged care provider. Kerrie explained that the organisation was celebrating 140 years of caring for Australians.

Their beginnings started with one nurse working within the inner-city slums of Melbourne and has now grown to an organisation employing over 16,000 nurses and volunteers within 88 residential care homes. Historically, it is named after Brigadier William Bolton a serving soldier in WW1, a founding member of the Returned Sailors and Soldiers League, a



Did you know: That performing CPR can double a person's chances of survival from a cardiac arrest and that 75% of cardiac arrests happen in the home?

Mastering CPR and Defibrillation basics will give you the confidence to act when it matters most. And feel empowered and confident to recognise the signs of a cardiac event and attempt resuscitation. Any attempt at resuscitation is better than none.

A video introduction to the comical behaviour of Mr. Bean alerted us to some of the signs to look for:

- a shortness of breath
- slurred speech sudden
- Sudden onset of pain in a specific region of the body
- change of skin colour (e.g. Pale, blue)
- lost consciousness
- seizure
- or unusual behaviour. Types of cardiac events

It was also emphasised that we can all be proactive with a nutritional diet, regular exercise, control of diabetes risks and taking prescribed medications on a regular basis.

Types of cardiac events

Angina – Temporary reduction in heart's blood supply

Heart Attack – Complete loss of blood flow to part of the heart

Cardiac Arrest – Electrical malfunction in the heart causing the heart to stop beating or to beat irregularly

Michelle explained the DRSABCD Action plan and demonstrated on Kerry an easy way to roll a person into the unconscious recovery position and the pistol grip.

Michelle emphasised that you must continue CPR until responsiveness returns or expert help arrives. Give 30 Compressions and 2 rescue breaths. She emphasised that your adrenalin usually kicks in to assist you to continue until help arrives or the person begins to show signs of improvement. Continue CPR for as long as possible or/and until help arrives.

If you haver access to a Automated External Defibrillation Kit (AED) follow instructions inside it.

Next, Michelle demonstrated the workings of a Defibrillator and pad placement in the 'seat belt' position. The Defibrillation once activated explains the necessary steps to take.





Follow any visual instruction (placement of chest pads). Placement of pads may include cutting persons clothing or shaving away chest hair for best skin contact with pads.

Follow audible instructions: keep performing CPR; stop for machine to assess if any cardiac output; clear from person (NO CONTACT with them what so ever); wait for machine to charge; press 'green' button when instructed to do so; wait further instruction; recommence CPR or place person in recovery position if the regain consciousness.

However, it is important that the Defibrillator is maintained regularly as expiry dates exist for the pads and batteries. A green light indicates it is in working order.

Members were very appreciative of the clear and succinct instructions provided by both Kerry and Michelle and now feel empowered to take the necessary steps to assist in saving a life. Allowing members to experiment of the dummy model also assisted with confidence.

Michelle and Kerry thank you for your very informative talk today.

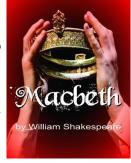

Theatre Report: <u>Macbeth, by William Shakespeare</u>, Malvern Theatre Saturday 21st June, 2025

"Out, damned spot! out, I say!" To be clear, it wasn't the dog. Lady Macbeth herself was totally responsible for her guilty conscious, as part of the plot to replace King Duncan with her husband in the role.

Four Deepdene Probus members trotted off recently to see one of the umpteen performances of this play. It might be an oldie, but it is still a goodie and its central theme of people fighting for supremacy and territory are still as relevant today as they were in the 17th century. As the program, says, the play is about "Unchecked ambition, witches and ghosts, castles and swordfights [in a] harrowing exploration of crime and guilt, power and corruption."



With a cast of 16 players, I imagined them in serried rows on Malvern Theatre's small stage. The play did start with a fight and (obligatory??) mass slaughter in the opening scenes, so that may have decimated their ranks, but thereafter, groups of players came on and went off stage as the story unfolded. Even though I studied the play at school, I still found it a bit difficult to keep up with who was who, except for the king in his crown. The period costumes probably indicated rank for those in the know.

The set was wonderful, as usual. A circular crown-shaped "piece" also represented the castle tower amid trees (Burnam Wood?). Mainly manipulated by some very sinister witches, it opened out in various ways to indicate where the action was taking place (trees, a seat, etc.). Speaking of the witches – they had a very small cauldron! It looked a bit like a fruit bowl, but pinches of powder the witches threw from it seemed to be enough for hexing.

It was very pleasing to see so many younger actors, although the sudden appearance in the audience of the Porter was very well played by a "veteran". All in all, a great production and an enjoyable afternoon spent by performers and audience members alike.

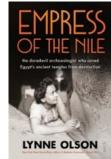
BOOK CLUB

The Empress of the Nile, author Lynne Olsen

On Monday 23rd June we met to discuss our June book; The Empress of the Nile.

An Egyptian historic monument account, explained in detail by an author dedicated to factual research.

The novel begins by describing the early life of the central character, Christiane Desroches-Noblecourt in Paris, pre World War Two. An educated young woman determined to study Egyptian archaeology, participate in digs in Egypt and help curate the Egyptian collection at the Paris museum. With the encouragement and guidance of her parents, introductions by her father to influential people, she was able to follow her passion. Initially working at the Paris museum in the Egyptology department.



Her life is shown to be totally devoted to all things ancient Egypt. Her marriage and family life given few pages, while her archaeological endeavours and achievements complete most of the book. Christiane Desroche–Noblecourt, a woman completing a classical education, employed as a museum curator, member of the French Resistance during WW 11, archaeologist in Egypt during many changing political regimes. An expert negotiator to successfully activate interest in the salvation of the temple of Abu Simbel, about to be drowned by the Nile River upon the completion of the Upper Aswan Dam.

Details of the master plan to cut, lift, shift and reassemble the huge monuments is illustrated clearly. Her endeavours to motivate and involve political leaders in Egypt, the U.K. France and even President John Fitzgerald Kennedy, the President of the United States of America, at the instigation of his wife Jackie who was fascinated with Egyptian History.

The rivalry of the male and female archaeologists illustrates the efforts several men made to actively undermine Christiane. Her decisions to protest or compromise, makes for interesting comparisons to the male and female competition still existing in workplaces.

Though a wife and a mother, her sphere of interest, as depicted by the author, seemed to be totally to unearthing, saving and studying as many relics of ancient Egypt as possible. Through her care for the local people on the dig sites, she earned their respect and life-long friendships. These people seemed closer to her than her actual family.

Learning more of Egyptian history, the work and effort dedicated by Christiane Desroches-Noblecourt, The Empress of the Nile, engaged the Probus Reading Group and a stimulating discussion took place. Although a long and detailed book, nine of the twelve members present finished the book. The discussion was further enhanced as some group members had visited Egypt and also, the relocated temples at Abu Simbel. The sharing of additional information, reflections and knowledge gave us personal impressions from their travels in Egypt.

Score: 9.5, the general group opinion of this biography.

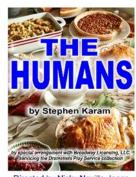
