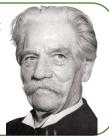
I hope some or all of these strike a chord and help us realise what we do have and can appreciate despite our aches and pains.

Matt has worked at Arty Bees Bookshop since 1993 and gave us an entertaining and informative look into the world of second-hand books. He took us through the history of the business since it was founded in 1988 by Bob Burch, (who named it as a play on his

initials, RTB), and its several moves around the Cuba Street area until the shop finally settled in its present location in Manners Street, where it holds over 80,000 titles on its shelves.

The shop has seen off many challenges over the years due to competition, changes in reading habits and the rise of the e-book and online shopping, but it has survived by specialising in New Zealand books, fantasy, science fiction and rare or out-of-print editions. They maintain a "wants list" of hardto-find titles, contacting interested customers when copies appear, and use AbeBooks for listing valuable items internationally. They use recycled materials for packaging and promote environmental sustainability, and emphasize transparency when buying from customers, so that if a book sells for much more than expected, they will contact the seller to offer additional payment.

The business has recently been sold to a long-time customer, and they are looking forward to keeping this much-loved Wellington bookshop going long into the future.

## A Cautionary Tale – by Barbara Eagle

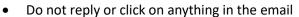

he latest meeting of the Hot Stuff Baking Group took place on Tuesday 12th August and on this occasion we visited the UK to get our baking inspiration; we made Eccles Cakes.

Eccles is a market town within the City of Salford, close to Manchester, and its major claim to fame is its reputation for these little pastries, which have always been referred to as cakes; they have been produced in the town for centuries. Apparently the town's parish church used to hold an annual service known as the Eccles Wakes, after which a fair was held and food and drink, including Eccles cakes, were consumed; when the



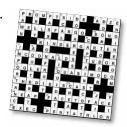
Puritans came to power in 1650, however, both Eccles Wakes and Eccles cakes were banned, as they were considered too rich and sumptuous!



The cakes are now made with puff pastry rather than flour, but the filling is probably much the same as it was all that time ago! We used butter, sugar, mixed peel (not available in Miramar a couple of days ago, but sourced in Kilbirnie!), cinnamon, nutmeg and currants; we cut out rounds of pastry, filled them with the currant mixture and sealed them, rolled them flat and baked them in a hot oven. They were just delicious, and in fact....they were rich and sumptuous!

## Telephone Banking – a simple and easy alternative to internet banking just by using your phone.

efore internet banking became ubiquitous and Dwidely available, many of us used telephone banking. This service is still available from all the major banks, a user-friendly free service which can perform many of the basic functions of internet banking but without the need for internet or Wi-Fi. All you need is a landline or mobile phone.

We can have telephone and internet banking, with telephone banking as an alternative when internet banking via phone, tablet or computer is unavailable.

Enter your four digit PIN Call 0800 113 355 Follow the number then # and push option 1 voice prompts Skip or change an Check account balance automatic payment 1)(2)(3) Find out your credit Transfer money 4 (5) (6) card minimum payment between your and due date 789 accounts (\*)(0)(#) Check your recent Other services such as transactions order a statement payments to an existing biller

The diagram above is typical of the main transactions

you can do with your phone and covers many of the day-to-day functions we transact with internet banking. You will only need to speak to an operator for such things as adding a new name to your existing list of payees.

A useful article from BNZ: "How to use Telephone Banking" also gives an idea of what is involved. All banks will have a similar guide.

An initial phone call to your bank will guide you through the set-up and provide you with a unique access code, which should be kept private and secure. After that you can do all your normal banking even when you don't have access to the internet.

SUMMARY: For anyone who is looking for an alternative to internet banking on their phone, computer or other device, telephone banking is the way to go.
