

September 2024 Mini Speaker: Shirley Murphy ...

Shirley shared an amazing milestone in her life, which is not recommended for the fainthearted, but extremely interesting! included an SIS induction in preparation for a posting abroad, while the William Sutch intrigue and espionage accusations were playing out in NZ at the same time as her own work in the unique diplomatic world ... ending with an ice skating incident leaving her with a badly fractured leg and on return to NZ a further nine months of Auckland hospital care and also a few questions, as we could all imagine ... seeing after skating successfully for 30 minutes and just about to leave the rink a solid Russian man came unexpectedly from behind and slammed into her.

50 years ago as a bright and adventurous 21 year old, Shirley had signed up to work as a Senior Stenographer with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in

Wellington with the knowledge that she would likely be posted to a NZ Embassy or High Commission overseas within a year. She thoroughly enjoyed 6 months living and working at the MFA offices and at the back rooms of the old Parliament Buildings, where in Pitman's shorthand, she recorded all sorts of political reports from many senior career diplomatic staff. months after starting she was asked to go to the newly re-opened NZ Embassy in Moscow.

NZ had a legation with the Soviet Union from 1944-1950 and then a full Embassy was reopened in 1973. With little knowledge of the SU, in hindsight likely a very good thing, and much against her mother's wishes, Shirley accepted the position and in preparation attended summer school Russian lessons at Victoria University. Space doesn't allow more of Shirley's wellpresented 12 minute talk, sorry ... We were all spell bound and will want more ...

> September 2024 MAIN SPEAKER: was Cathy Flynn Past President Joan Flynn proudly introduced her well qualified daughter who had studied Law in Auckland & is now based in Thames with her own Practice. I think it was in the New Plymouth area when she became a Court appointed Barrister for children and adolescence and to work with their families. Her talk today was of her concern regarding the needs we may have when setting into place any Enduring Power of Attorney legal documents covering both personal property and

health. Caution is needed for our protection when we select who is to make decisions on our behalf and she mentioned a need for a successor attorney to be appointed too.

Cathy did say that the Act of 1988 is desperately in need of updating! A difficult and troublesome 'ahem cough' wanted to get in the way of her presentation sadly and we all felt grateful that she worked so hard to continue, rather than disappoint by leaving us without a speaker, thank you Cathy.
