Mini Speaker: Chris & Colin Hovell on Friday 8th November 2024 represented Thames, Hauraki and Paeroa Probus Clubs at Government House, in Wellington by attending a 50th Anniversary High Tea Celebration hosted by the Governor General's husband, His Excellency, Dr Richard Davies.

Official entry form and QR codes were scanned at the gate and a taxi drove up a long driveway of lush plants and native trees led into an area of



well-manicured lawns past the main entrance of the most impressive building with its grand high Portico of great gleaming white pillars. Hardly stopped ... the doors were opened by a uniformed official, (is this Hollywood?) It was rather hard to hear anything on entering the main hall with the sound of the grand piano and the usual happy chatter of 90 plus Probus members blending in. On the dot of 2.00 pm all attendees were called to order by a gold braided uniformed senior staff member, who announced that the hall the gathering was in was the Grand Ballroom. She followed with Health and Safety regs and protocol for all to be standing on His Excellency's arrival. His Excellency welcomed all on behalf of his wife Dame Cindy Kiro, then acknowledged Probus leaders : Silvana Matignago (PSPL CEO), Michael Ransom (PSPL Chairman) and Margaret Drake (Director of Probus South Pacific in NZ) before speaking of his life in general : During his school years he was enthralled with the Kenyan runners and their world winning running ability and spent some time there before going to quite a few other countries, including the Falkland Islands. He was in the Merchant Navy and then trained as a doctor in Ireland before working in various countries including England and Ireland and finally moved to NZ working with the Auckland City Mission's Calder Centre and is now working as a G. P. in the Wellington area.

He congratulated Probus on 50 years in NZ and a after the speeches he visited all the tables where one member asked who would win the rugby NZ or the Irish, but he graciously declined to choose a winner!

Guest Speaker: David Baker, whose wife Helen keeps him young delighted all with his



recollections of his pleasure in climbing Mount Taranaki on his 90th birthday with some of his family.

On the 26th of January this year, with a party of 13 and on a perfect day they started out at 5am using torches and twelve and a half hours later they reached the top, thus enabling Dave to win the 'Oldest' to do so award and also the 'slowest' to do so award!

They did get to the top successfully but in respect of Maori culture their team did not stand right on the summit, which is considered sacred ground. Then reality hit as the climbers



reflected on the realization of being only half way through the climb and after appreciating magnificent and satisfying views there is the challenge of climbing down ... and to remain safe in some steep areas needing to crawl down. There have been 84 deaths recorded on Mt

Taranaki including two of a rescue party endeavoring to reach a group of nurses whose lives were lost after a change in the weather. A partly cemented portion of the track called the Puffer is extremely difficult; it is ever so steep and hard to navigate up and or down!

What a positive attitude David has which showed as he reminisced on being a boy lucky enough to live at the base of the mountain on his parents' property and of earning 2/6 for the tail of a goat. Yes, he was a young goat hunter assisting in the culling of goats by using a knife until he saved enough to buy a rifle. He would have first climbed the mountain when he was a 12 year old, needing to cut ice steps to get up the steep slopes of which there were so many.

Now he is considering another attempt when he turns 95 ... but let's hope he is teasing...
