March 2025 Main Speaker: Peter Forde ... Speaking on the commissioning of Power stations on the Waikato River as an electrical engineer ...

Peter introduced himself with a shy smile in recalling advice from his daughter when he mentioned to her he was to be speaking at Probus... "Don't be too graphic, keep it simple... or you will bore them to tears. Being born in London during the war years his family life was disrupted when they were evacuated ... he and his siblings were placed in different hostels for 5 years ... then Peter spent time in a Doctor Barnardo House for a while before eventually being able to join his three Aunties at their large Estate... Meanwhile his Mother had been manpowered to work on spitfire radio equipment ... their street had been severely bombed and sadly they were not allowed to return there. His father's influence on Peter, by reading



Sherlock Homes and poetry to him, led to a lot of grammar school years being spent at the library... an interest in Math's developed and he became an engineering cadet ... watching turbines ... Boats interested him ... had 4 years at sea where he helped a New Zealander with his razor problem who in appreciation suggested New Zealand needed Peter! Through that contact Peter did indeed find his way to Wellington and eventually to his work at the Arapuni Power Station; a

Government built hydroelectric station on the Waikato River, fairly close to Hamilton. It plays an important part in the voltage supply to the city and Peter helped increase that supply from 75% to 90%? ... as he delved into detail his daughter had jokingly steered him away from ...

Then he left talking of work and shared his musical skill with a presentation of two soft love songs... 'Dance Me to the End of Love' and 'Autumn Leaves'... Peter then responded well to a good number of questions from the floor and President Shirley thanked him with a gift for sharing his intersting life with an appreciative Probus audience.

As Shirley closed the March General meeting, which had followed the AGM ... Colin amused us with this story of growing strawberries in the village's annual competition ... "People claimed they put fertaliser on their strawberriess ... it sure surprised us ... as we always put cream on ours"
