lan's topic was the arrival of the popular TE20 Massey Grey Fergie Tractor.

After some technical problems with our computer Peter Ansell rushed home to get his, as ours was unable to show a video supplied by Ian Broad. The video showed an overview of the mighty Grey Fergie Tractor in. the Burnie and Ridgley areas in the 1950's. This very popular little Fergie was born in

England in 1956, designed and engineered by Henry Ferguson. It was built in York by the Davis Brown Company. The video showed us scenes of tractors being railed into Burnie in the 1950's. Jack Townsend sold many of these to eager Northwest farmers. It was a very versatile tractor and could be used to plough, pull headers and balers etc.

Our members really appreciated seeing old scenes of this tractor from years ago being driven through the streets of Burnie and fully laden rail carriages of the tractors arriving in Burnie. Also, there were scenes of field days where the tractor is ploughing a 3 bladed plough! The Fergie was very much used in the planting of potatoes, a very popular crop at this time to make a good profit!

Thank you lan for showing this to us; I'm sure it brought back memories to many of us! P.S. This little gem of a tractor can still be found on properties along the NW Coast.

Guest Speaker: Grant Youd

Grant started his career as a station porter and eventually rose to the position of a senior train driver with The Tasmanian Government Railways.

In the early days of rail in Tasmania a large workforce was needed to maintain and operate the steam engines, carriages, rails, and to have plenty of coal on hand.

The railways were started by 3 barons from England who perhaps did not communicate well enough and ended up each having different rail gauges, hence they all failed!.

Eventually however a railways system evolved, forming the TGR. There was a passenger service operating in Tasmania from Burnie to Launceston and Hobart but due to lack of passengers it ceased in 2009.

Grant reminisced about the good old days when there were many people employed with the railways and the camaraderie and larks he enjoyed at this time. He recalled that in the early days there was always a job available at the railways, whether you could read and write or not

Grant also mentioned the difficulties/dangers he endured in driving today's diesel engines from Burnie to Rosebery where it takes a some expertise in operating the brakes going up and down steep grades, not going too fast in negotiating bends!, and yes rails do bend and do stretch due to usage, particularly when on the West Coast run! President Gradus welcomed new member Robert Haslock to the Club.






