May Meeting



President David welcomes David Dean into the club.

Club speakers: (Possibly our first father and son speaker duo, David and Damian Bissett). **David** spoke feelingly about the remarkable APPM Council, which for many years devoted itself to the 3,300 employees of APPM. Amongst its services were a dental clinic, medical benefits and a hard luck fund. David was a member of the Council Committee and his talk made clear how the APPM Council was an important part of Burnie's story, demonstrating the significant impact of industry on community development and the importance of social welfare initiatives in supporting a thriving community.





Damian described his career in Forestry. He was part of North Forest Holdings and subsequently of Forico, now Tasmania's largest private forest manager, with approximately 173,000 hectares of land across the state. Damian explained how eucalypt seeds develop, how they are harvested and how they are raised in the nursery. Finally, he described the planting of the seedlings, and discussed the merits of the various species which are grown.

Guest Speaker, Anthony Haneveer, Editor of *The Advocate* presented a stirring picture of the print media. He described his own story at the paper – from Copy Boy to Editor, and, being born and raised in the North-West, he is committed to sharing the stories that matter to the people of our region. Anthony emphasised that the principal function of a regional paper is to give a voice to the people. He cited two stories in which *The Advocate* achieved justice for people who had been hard done by, and reminded us that it was our newspaper which forced the government to see sense over the



location of Burnie's new courthouse. He says that governments and authorities do take notice of newspapers.

Anthony explained that the future of regional papers is online. Large numbers of subscribers choose to read their *Advocate* this way, which puts in question how long the print issue will survive. Moreover, costs have risen so dramatically that there needs to be a page limit for every print issue, and to make ends meet, all three Tasmanian papers are printed on the one press in Hobart. However, in whatever form *The Advocate* appears, Anthony assured the members that it will always give the Northwest a unified voice.

Even light physical activity, when paired with social interaction, can improve balance, reduce the risk of falls, and support overall wellbeing.

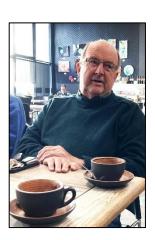
