Included is a car-parking strategy, a transport strategy, and the creation of city centre playground spaces. Shane reported that the \$20m Arts centre redesign is nearing conclusion and that a redevelopment of the Upper Burnie Sports Centre is being planned. Details of the 2027 Burnie Bi-Centennial celebration are forthcoming. Shane ended his informative presentation by predicting a rich future for the city from the coming Marinus Link.

Where do you get your news and can you trust it?

National Seniors reports: Among the main sources of news, TV news does still rule, but for the first time since the Australian survey began, social media platforms have overtaken online news as a main source of news. Facebook remains the top social media platform for news consumption overall.

However, online platforms are also regarded as posing a major <u>misinformation</u> threat, with 59% of respondents nominating Facebook, followed by TikTok (57%), X (49%), Instagram (42%), and YouTube (35%).

Encouragingly, when people encounter misinformation, 39% said they turned to trusted news sources to **check the veracity of the information**. This represents good fact-checking practice, which is key to navigating a complex media environment.


