

October Meeting



President David gave a very warm welcome to **Penguin Probus** President, Leonie Bramich and Secretary, Jenny Rowden. He congratulated the Penguin club on their establishment, wished them every success for the future and foreshadowed close future co-operation between the two clubs. Jenny responded very graciously, thanking our club for its assistance.

Arthur Holland who is trying out the club, was also made very welcome.

John Packham received an accolade for his recent trip to Queensland, where he presented to the winner, a scholarship in Baking. The award is in memory of John's father who, like John, was a master baker.

A posthumous accolade was recorded for Brian Smith, who is to be recognised at this year's Lions Convention for his many years of service to that organisation.

Club Speaker Peter Ansell demonstrated the current power of Artificial Intelligence with some eyebrow-raising examples. Peter attributes Al's remarkable rate of evolution to user acceptance, pointing out that governments are powerless to manage the phenomenon. He illustrated the ability of Al to manipulate attitudes with his Big Sultana experiment, proving that we viewers must be alert, skeptical and even suspicious of what we see. At the same time however, Al agents such as booking clerks, telephone receptionists and information kiosks, being better informed than human operators, are enormously valuable. Peter explained that while there is potential danger in the ability of Al to educate itself, it has evolved critical thinking, so its analysis of issues is unemotional and free of dogmas. Peter will continue this fascinating discussion at a future meeting.

Guest Speaker David Dean spoke with great authority about Tasmania's Forestry Industry and the issues which it is facing. David first described how the industry operates – site preparation, planting, fertilising, pest exclusion, thinning, harvesting and preparing for the next crop. He explained how current community sensibilities have created difficulties for foresters, examples being the banning of poisons and snares, and urban objections to smoke in the air.

David next outlined a number of destructive issues confronting the industry.

Firstly, he said, far too much Tasmanian forest has been locked up unnecessarily.

Eucalypt forests need patient management to be productive and will degenerate if denied this. Secondly, he pointed out that ownership of forestry companies is now in overseas hands so the only return to Tasmania is the payment of royalties and the consequence of exporting our first-grade timber is a shortage of timber here!!

Moreover, the manufacturing of timber products has left the state. For example, all veneer is sent away for the making of plywood which we then need to import. As David explained, what was once a booming Tasmanian industry, is now a shadow of its former self. David had time to answer only a few of the many questions which arose from his talk. He intends to bring representatives of various branches of the industry to look further into this important topic.




