

TRIP TO PETERSHAM - EGYPTIAN ROOM


Train from Castle Hill to Petersham via Central for 30 of our members, and a short walk to an unassuming brick building which contains the Egyptian Room.


The room was created in the 1920's as part of a Masonic lodge in College St Sydney until the 1960's. When the building was being demolished, the frieze was dismantled and stored until re-erected at Petersham in 1977. The room is still used today for Masonic meetings. The frieze is wrapped around the 4 walls and represents certain scenes or vignettes from the Scroll of Ani from 1200 BC. (The original is 78 feet long by 15 inches high).

Our guide, Bill Richards a veritable encyclopaedia on the frieze and the dozens of vignettes, walked us through what each meant and the story of transition to the afterlife by Ani. The bottom line was the message that if you live a good and honourable life you will be accepted into the afterlife by God, although there will be a number of trials along the way to prove yourself worthy.

Who knew that this existed in our city? It was like walking into a time capsule. So, an interesting if different outing. A short walk to the RSL and a welcome drink and lunch was next and then we all made our way home by different methods and at different times.











The Prince Henry Hospital Nursing and Medical Museum Tour

Tuesday September 30

It was a truly perfect Spring day when 49 of us met and boarded the coach for our easy trip to Little Bay (it was school hols which always helps with traffic). Prince Henry Hospital Nursing and Medical Museum couldn't be in a more scenic setting, on the beautiful shores of Little Bay.

After a morning tea break we separated into 4 groups to be led around by volunteer retired Prince Henry Nurses. Their personal involvement in the site made what they had to tell us all the more interesting.

In 1881 Coast Hospital was established as NSW's first hospital for infectious diseases. The first disease treated was Leprosy and the Nursing School and surgical division was established in 1894. The Bubonic Plague outbreak in 1900 was treated by Coast Nurses at The Quarantine Station and at Coast. Smallpox, Influenza, Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Measles, Mumps and Polio were just some of the other diseases treated at this Little Bay Hospital. In 1934 the hospital was renamed Prince Henry Hospital. It closed in 2003.

The Museum now maintains an extensive collection of documents, artefacts and memorabilia of the Hospital and the doctors, nurses, patients and support staff. The displays were well done and you really could have spent all day, if you were to read everything. Many of us commented that we had seen most of the equipment ourselves over the years, but boy have things changed nowadays in modern hospitals. Their iron lungs and fracture beds were certainly scary looking to me.

A 2 minute drive to the Yarra Bay Sailing Club was next, where they very efficiently served us with our pre-ordered meals whilst we looked out over the blue waters and very white sands of the little beach in front of the Club. On the way home I enquired of those present how many had ever been to the Prince Henry Hospital when it was open and out of 49 there were only 7. So, for most of us it was a unique experience and how great is it that we have managed to hold onto a bit of Sydney's history so well.






Brunch Group Sunday September 28
