### AUGUST GUEST SPEAKER - MURRAY WILTON

Our guest speaker for August was Murray Wilton (right), well known radio broadcaster on 2GB as one of the "two Murrays" and General Manager of Agriculture and the Royal Easter Show for the Royal Agricultural Society of NSW since 2013.

He was not an academic and after his schooling at Trinity Grammar in Summer Hill, he studied Economics and Accounting and also learnt to fly. Following the breakup of his parents' marriage, he was encouraged by his grandmother and she got him a job at what is now Westpac Bank. He studied accounting at TAFE for the next two years.



Murray also did a Future School of Radio course at North Sydney run by Today FM which led to a job at 2GB as a master controller operator, after leaving the bank.



He next moved to 2UE in Goulburn for 2½ years to work in talk back radio. They were the first radio station to play BG's music, leading to a visit by the Gibb brothers and drawing a huge crowd of locals. From Goulburn he went to Canberra where he was head-hunted by 2UE for the midnight to dawn show & filling in for Garry O'Callahan. He then worked for Allan Jones. Joining forces with Murray Olds, they became The Two Murrays and tripled the number of listeners and got the second highest ratings. The new program director pulled them off the air and

after several radio jobs, he resigned from radio, taking the job of General Manager of Agriculture at the Royal Agricultural Society. What had been his hobby was now his career.

He has spent 12 years with the RAS, organising educational programs, career days for 50 different careers and of course the Royal Easter Show - which he calls "a beast" - needing to be reinvented each year. He feels that it should be a positive experience for people attending the show, but must be about agriculture. He needs to set 26 budgets for the show, oversee the 120 acres for the RAS and bring the feeling of a country town to the RAS each day of the show. 14,000 animals, 300 temporary structures are just a part of what is the largest travelling carnival in Australia. Murray is certainly a busy man and a very entertaining speaker.

## Temple Tales Tour 15 Aug 2025

Even our tour guide was sceptical about the rain spoiling our planned tour. But we trusted the forecast and the rain stopped overnight leaving us with a warm sunny day. Which was lucky as we had to leave our shoes out in the open for our first stop - the Murugan Hindu Temple at Mays Hill. Lots of grumbles as we had to walk a very short distance barefoot (or some left on their socks) on cold rough surface to get into the temple, but once inside the floor was heated and am pleased to say we all



survived. We were informed about all the temple deities - Ganesha, Shiva, Murugan, Meenadchi and others. Luck was on our side again as we were in attendance at a Pooja time and so saw the priest making offerings, mantras and prayers to each of the deities, complete with bell ringings and chants. Our volunteer guide and Judith Dunn both answered all our questions and were very informative.

Next stop was a welcome cuppa and biscuits at Central Gardens, Merrylands where we soaked up the sun and had a chat. Then we were off to Phuoc Hue Temple (Vietnamese Buddhist) at Wetherill Park in the industrial area. Founded in 1985 this temple was named after the first Buddhist monk to come to Australia. Prayers are chanted 5 times a day starting at 4.30am in this temple. Again Judith instructed us on the history and customs of this site.

Lunch was next at the very large Marconi Club in Bossley Park. We somehow seemed to split into two groups here with one lot heading for the buffet and the other the bistro. But we all managed to find some sustenance before climbing back aboard the bus.

The last temple we alighted to see was the Ming Sue Lay Chinese Buddhist Temple at Bonnyrigg which had several smaller shrines as well as several temple areas for people to pray respect to Buddhas, Bodhisattvas and Taoist gods. There is a wishing tree, the Guanine Fountain, several Memorial Chambers and a beautiful gazebo. A very peaceful sanctuary.


During the day we also stopped outside the St Hurmzid's Assyrian Cathedral where people who have come from Iran, Iraq, Syria and Lebanon worship. Also the Croatian Church of St Nicola Tavelic which is a Catholic Church surrounded by a medieval castle wall. We also learnt about Khemarangsaram Khmer Temple founded by Cambodian migrants after the arrival of their first monk in the 1980's. Try pronouncing that name quickly!

Our last stop for the day almost didn't happen as apparently they forgot we were coming, and were just about to close. On seeing 50 eager shoppers approaching however they decided to fit us in. And so it was they we entered the Holland House in the back blocks of Smithfield and bought up big on Dutch sweets, cakes and lots of licorice.

Apart from going shoeless for a short time and boarding the coach (I think) 7 times, the day seemed quite easy and relaxed and I am sure we all learnt something about the different cultures and beliefs of some of the people of Sydney.




## UNIWORLD BOUTIQUE RIVER CRUISE




evening he tantalized us with the culinary delights on our dinner menu. Of course, no visit to France would be complete without numerous visits to wineries and a little wine tasting!

At the fear of being accused of repetition may I once again remind members of the importance of ensuring they sign in when they first arrive at a General Meeting.

In the event of an evacuation we can use the sign on sheets to ensure all attendees have cleared the hall.

In addition to this request to initially sign on, we would ask that if you intend to leave the meeting early you indicate your intention on the sign on sheet or notify the Membership Officer of your intention. Again this is a way of ensuring your well being should there be an evacuation.

Should we have to evacuate the hall we can use the double doors out into the foyer or the double doors at the rear of the hall.

Once outside the hall the evacuation point will be the grassed area below the stairs to the carpark.
